## "PETE" WILLIAMS ELECTED CAPTAIN FOR NEXT YEAR

Alumni Banquet Held at Al-  
amance Hotel.

NINETEEN MEN RECEIVED  
THE COVETED "E".

"Pete" Williams, "smiling full  
back" on the Elon College eleven, was  
selected as captain for the 1930 team  
by the unanimous choice of his team-  
mates at the football banquet, annually  
given the players by the alumni, at  
the Alamance Hotel at Burlington.

Williams has played a sensational  
game for the Walker coached Christians  
during the season, and has been selected  
by many of the sports writers and of-  
ficials for an all-state berth at fullback.  
Because of his outstanding record on  
the team this year his election to the  
captaincy for next season comes as no  
surprise to his friends here. It is their  
unanimous choice that he richly de-  
serves this signal honor.

The banquet was attended by a large  
number of the alumni, college officials,  
and the entire football squad. It was  
an enthusiastic meeting and abundant  
praises were showered upon the ath-  
letes for their excellent record during  
the season. Mr. J. H. Barker served as  
toastmaster for the occasion, and the  
principal speaker of the evening was  
Prof. R. S. Rainey of Biacoe, N. C.  
His wit and humor contributed greatly  
to the entertainment. Many of the

quet.
