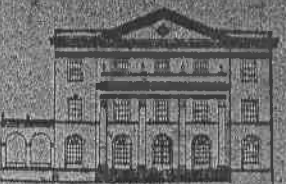

## Dramatic Club To Present Three Plays On March 10

The Playmakers of Elon College will present on Friday evening, March 10, three one-act plays in "Vengeance Height" by Allen Is. "Such is Fame" by Herbert and "When Angry Count Hundred" by Anonymous.

The first mentioned play is the one to be presented in the one-act tournament sponsored by the Drama Dramatic association at Chapel Hill during the Dramatic festival, March 30, 31 and April 1. Playmakers have been invited to Chapel Hill without a monetary contest, so they will in their drama at Chapel Hill the night of April 1. The play is presented at Elon March 10. The students and friends of college may see the production if it is entered in the contest in "Vengeance Height" is a gripping story of a mountain feud. The main role of Gram Garnsey, a mountain woman, is being played by Mrs. C. M. Cannon. Hope under the neighbor girl, is played by Miss Marguerite Harris. Cannon, the murderous mountaineer by Walter Latham, and Garnsey, the young boy, by Rawls. The play is most interesting and difficult but the production with the excellent cast promises to be most effective. "Such is Fame" is a very light

comedy, in direct contrast to "On Vengeance Height." The story winds around an authoress who has just achieved success with her first novel, her maid and confidant, and her two aunts, from whom she has drawn one of the characters of the book. The authoress, Jessica Wynbush, is portrayed by Miss Elmira Rhoads. The part of the maid, who is faithful and sympathetic, but somewhat "dumb" is taken by Miss Patricia Holden. Miss Thelma Morris will play as "Miss Agatha Prynne, the aunt through whose veins courses the blood of the Plantagenets"; and Miss Lillie Horne will play as Miss Rebecca Tidway, the other aunt, who "wears the mantle of Pataou."

"When Angry Count One Hundred" is a dialogue—the scene being in the dining room of a house of Fifth avenue in New York. Imagine the embarrassment of Miss Eva Rosewalne when at a dinner party she finds herself placed at a table for two, and the other occupant is Mr. Alfred Ames, whom she loved only a week before, never to speak to again! What happens? Miss Frances Chandler and Mr. Paul Taylor will tell you in their presentation of "When Angry Count One Hundred."

All three plays are presented under the direction of Miss Virginia Fitzhugh, dramatic director.

## Elon Singers Return After Successful Trip

### Eastern Virginia Tour of Organization Made By Bus and Lasts Five Days; Soloists' Work Receives Especial Acclaim.

The Elon Singers finished their Eastern Virginia tour Tuesday afternoon when the bus arrived at Elon again. The group had given 11 programs in five days during their extensive trip. The singers were entertained in private homes in the communities where the programs were given. They never stayed, however, more than one night in one place.

The bus left Elon Thursday morning, February 23 for Franklin. Two programs were given there— one Thursday night in the Christian church, the other Friday morning in the Franklin high school. The group stopped next at Norfolk to sing at the Elon banquet at which Dr. J. E. Rawls was toastmaster. A program was given in Holland Christian church Saturday night, and the singers were entertained in Holland homes. On Sunday morning the group went to Suffolk for two programs, to South Norfolk Christian church for the afternoon, and to the Christian Temple in Norfolk for the evening program. This program marked the climax of the tour. On Monday morning the singers visited South Norfolk High school to give a concert. Two pro-

grams were given on Monday night—one at Wakefield and the other at Waverly. Upon completing the Wakefield concert, the group went immediately to Waverly to begin theirs. Throughout the trip the singers had capably audiences. The work of the soloists deserves special mention because of the tension of the large number of programs given. For all members of the chorus, however, the tour was not a mere sight-seeing trip. Every minute was full of responsibility on everyone. The programs consisted of sacred and secular music, chorus pieces, solo, quartet arrangements, piano solos by the accompanist, and selections especially arranged by Professor Steere for the Madrigal club. The splendid work of Professor Steere made possible not only the trip itself but also the success of the tour. To him goes the credit for the enthusiastic reception of the singers by the audiences.

Professor Steere has arranged for other less extensive trips to be taken in the near future. The college choir will take part in the State Choir Festival to be held in Raleigh later in the spring.
