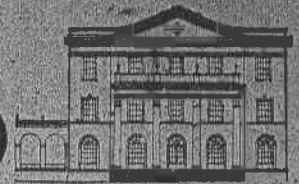

Chorus Practice Gets Underway Thursday; Everyone Urged to Attend.

Practice for the commencement oratorio to be presented on June 5, will begin Thursday night at seven-thirty o'clock in the auditorium. Everyone who has taken part in the festival choruses of the year is urged to attend, as well as those who, as yet, have not taken part. Practices will be held regularly on Thursday nights until commencement.

The oratorio is to be a part of the program presented on the night of June fifth, Class Day. The chorus will sing the second part of Coleridge Taylor's group: "Hiawatha's Childhood," "Hiawatha's Wedding Feast," and "Hiawatha's Departure." Of these, the one which the chorus will sing is "Hiawatha's Wedding Feast," the best-known Coleridge-Taylor is a famous English composer who has made these interpretations of Longfellow's poem of "Hiawatha." Probably the best part of the whole work is the tenor solo, "Onway."

The soloists and other features of the program will be announced later. Professor Steere is particularly anxious that he have a full chorus for this production. He is asking, therefore, that all those who sang in the "Messiah" and "Seven Last Words" choruses take part in this oratorio. He is also very much interested in adding others to the chorus from the college students, citizens, and residents of surrounding communities.
