Don't write Dean Lord, however. His answer probably would be as useless as our advice. His statistics concern the average and since we have only ourselves with which to deal, the commercial success or failure that we make of our lives is not compensated by the successes and failures of our colleagues.

Statistics will prove most anything. That the average college graduate will have earned \$150,000 by the time he reaches 60 does not necessarily mean that his college education has given him this earning capacity. In all probability he would have earned a good share of this anyway. Anyone capable of doing college work represents the upper percentage of the country's intelligence. Colleges are fortunate in being able to educate the best material.

This is not meant to imply that we doubt the value of college education, but we do believe that its commercial aspects are greatly overemphasized. The value of a college education cannot be measured in a commercial sense alone. It is our belief that when this side of it is stressed, it means the breakdown of any true system of education. The intangible values far exceed any that can be computed in dollars and cents.

TEST FOR COLLEGES

College students and administrators are facing an important problem. Legalization of 3.2 per cent beer has been effected by congress, and the question now arises as to what regulations, if any, will be found necessary or desirable in the nation's several college communities.

No sensible person would be so naive as to believe that there has been no drinking among college men during the prohibition era. But the truth is that most of this drinking has been of the sub-rosa variety, a fact which has tended to keep it somewhat out of sight.

Legal beer, however, will drag the whole problem out into the open. With the establishment of authorized drinking places, hitherto illicit beverages will enjoy good standing and will be much more readily available than they have been since 1920.

It behooves students and administrative officials alike to promote the ideals of rational temperance and reasonable restraint from the very start of the new experiment. Education should develop self-control. And people may well look to the colleges for an example of steady conduct in any period of social change.

A supreme effort should be made on every college campus, within the weeks immediately ahead, to discourage thoughtless excesses, and reckless celebrations. The college reaction will be watched closely and critically. It is squarely up to the American student to show that he has a level head.
