The intangible values far exceed any that can be computed in dollars and cents.

### TEST FOR COLLEGES

College students and administrators are facing an important problem. Legalization of 3.2 per cent beer has been effected by congress, and the question now arises as to what regulations, it any, will be found necessary of de-sirable in the nation's several college communities.

No sensible person would be so naive as to believe that there has been no drinking among college men during the prohibition era. But the truth is that most of this drinking has been of the sub-rosa variety, a fact which

has tended to keep it somewhat out of sight.
