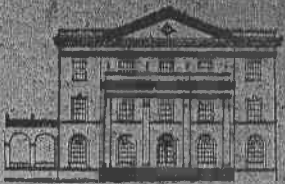

Elon Music Club Presents Group of Tar Heel Musicians in Program at the College.

The Elon Music club presented Wednesday night a concert by three Statesville artists to a large, appreciative audience. The concert was presented through arrangements with Mrs. Eugene Davis of Statesville, who accompanied the artists to Elon. She is the president of the state federation of music clubs, and an active musical clubwoman. Many other prominent musicians of the vicinity were also present.

The artists who took part in the program were Miss Ruby Johnson, violinist, Mrs. Velma Rawls Smith, pianist, and Mr. Hobart Whitman, organist and pianist. The concert varied in moods and styles, and provided delightful entertainment for the music-loving audience.

Too much cannot be said about the ability of the artists who rendered the numbers of the concert. They displayed an unusual amount of technique as well as unique interpretations of their groups. Each of the artists has been on the concert stage for several years, and each showed the ability which made stage success possible.

A great deal of credit is due also to Mrs. Davis who arranged the concert and brought it to Elon as a presentation of the local music club.

A formal dinner was given in the dining hall for the occasion, at which Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Smith were present as well as the artists and musical guests. A reception was held after the concert in honor of the Statesville artists and other guests from the various music clubs.
