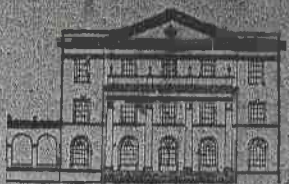

Every age has its peculiar characteristics. This age is characterized chiefly by its demand for specialization. Specialization always requires careful and adequate training. It is important for all who desire specialization to have opportunities of higher education—the lack of money is too often the limiting cause. Fortunate indeed is any community or county that has a high grade educational institution within its own borders. Such an institution offers to the young people of the homes of that community or county the advantages of advanced training at a very moderate cost.

Elon college is a high grade educational institution of the first rank. Its physical equipment is second to none. For the type of work it is expected to do it cannot be excelled. Every member of its faculty is adequately and thoroughly trained with the practical experience in his field of instruction. The atmosphere on campus is most refreshing. There will be a barbecue lunch served on the campus free to all. And by the way, if a number of those Alamance county citizens would join together and leave the pasture gate open so that a number of those fine pigs of theirs would find their way to the college in advance of the barbecue, it would be a most refreshing thing and you are invited to be our guest not only for this day, but for all the days of commencement. The program on Tuesday will begin promptly at 10 o'clock a. m. and Governor Ehringhaus will speak at 12 o'clock. We are inviting you — we hope you will come.

That is not true, the contractors who are remodeling East Dorm made excellent use of the granite steps of the old Administration in beautifying the entrance of East Dorm. These great granite blocks are the stepping stones to a modern equipped dormitory.

The steps have elevated many young men and women, physically and mentally, who are leaders of the world today.

We hope these steps will elevate many more to higher goals than ever before. Although their historical significance will never be conceived, materially they are granite which will never deteriorate, this sets a future for our Alma Mater.

The Forty-Fourth Annual Commencement of Elon college will be held this year, Friday evening, June 2, to Wednesday, June 7, inclusive. It begins Friday, at 8 p. m. with the representatives of the junior class delivering their orations.

On Saturday evening at 8 o'clock, the department of expression will present a three-act play, "Tangled Tales." Elon's dramatic department made a most favorable impression at the state contest, held at Chapel Hill, this spring. The players presented a one-act play, "On Vengeance Heights," and were most favorably received and commented upon by those who were in charge.

Sunday will be baccalaureate day. Dr. H. K. Eversaul, pastor of Walnut Hills Congregational church, Cincinnati, Ohio, will deliver the sermon to the graduates in glass. Dr. Eversaul is a member of the board of trustees and a most enthusiastic supporter of Elon College. It will be a pleasure to welcome Dr. Eversaul back for the baccalaureate sermon. At 4 o'clock there will be a joint organ recital at the Whitely Memorial auditorium by Miss Elizabeth Barney and Mr. Fletcher Moore.

According to a custom established some years ago, the president, Dr. L. E. Smith, will deliver the baccalaureate address Sunday at 8 p. m.

Monday will be Class Day exercises, art exhibit, and a rendition of "Hawthorn's Wedding Feast" by the Elon festival chorus. This is expected to be a most attractive program, and a large crowd is anticipated.

Tuesday will be Alumni Day. This was the main feature of the program last year, and it will substitute one of the most interesting features of the entire program this year. The address will be given by Honorable John C. H. Ehringhaus, governor of North Carolina. A free barbecue will be served to the public on the campus. A business meeting of the alumni will be held at 10 o'clock, and there will be a program of entertainment on the campus at 8 o'clock. The banquet will begin at 8:30 o'clock and the dinner will dress at 8 p. m. The address will be delivered by Professor A. H. Hall, of the English department, North Carolina Wesleyan.
