Coach Fysal arrived on the campus this week and has been busy getting the preliminary adjustmens in order for the opening of the season with the ringmen and grappling squads. Doctor Henry Louis Smith, pres-Gent emeritus of Washington and Lee university was the speaker in Whitley Auditorium on January 12. Dr. Smith spoke on "The Expanding Life", using as his text 'He shall grow like a cedar in Lehanon.'

In his sermon, Dr. Smith descrined four phases of the expanding life, namely its meaning, difficulties, process and its reward. The meaning he stated as growing, or an ever increasing knowredge, and human service and sympathy. The chief difficulty, he declared, lay in specialization. The process he compared to the growth of a large tree, with its branches spreading outward and upward, and its roots going into the earth. interpreting the reward, Dr. Smith quoted the last stanza of Holmes, The Chambered Nautibus.'
