

## Piano Recital Next Number Lyceum Card

Lucille and Louise Crowder Present Duo Piano Program Here Next Thursday

The next number on the Elon College Lyceum Course will be a duo piano recital by Lucille and Louise Crowder on March 12th in the Whitley Memorial Auditorium. This is an event that should prove most entertaining to Elon music lovers, as both Mr. and Mrs. Crowder are known as fine musicians.

Both the Crowders have appeared before Elon audiences recently. Last year Mr. Crowder presented a very fine piano recital as a feature of the lyceum course, and Mrs. Crowder appeared in recital with Mrs. Kay Rickert Deffenbacher. Both artists won high praise for their performances. This year they are back in duo piano recital, presenting some of the foremost works of two-piano literature.

Louise Crowder is head of the Music at Alliance, Ohio. He has studied both here and abroad, and has achieved recognition by world figures in music. At the Carnegie Institute of Technology he studied with Selmar Janson; and later in Europe he studied in Berlin with D'Albert and Petri, then in Paris with Casadesus, the great French pianist. Afterward, he and Mrs. Crowder spent some time in Spain, studying in particular modern Spanish music. While living on the island of Marjoca they studied intensively the music of the composer, Infante, and on their program here next week they will include a series of Spanish Dances by this composer.

The program is certain to be one of high rank, and Elon audiences are looking forward to their visit with anxious expectation.

## State Juniors Music Contest Will Be Here

North Carolina State Federation Of Music Clubs Hold Contest Next Saturday

On Saturday, March 14th the State Junior Contest of the North Carolina Federation of Music Clubs will be held at Elon College. The Elon Music Club will play host to the Federation Contest at this time.

The contestants range from the ages of six to eighteen, and represent the winners of the six district contests that will be held throughout the state this week. This contest will bring to Elon many of the young musicians of the state and will also bring some of the outstanding music leaders of the state, among them being: Mrs. J. S. Correll, the State president of the North Carolina Federation of Music Clubs, from Raleigh; Mrs. Grady Ross, the State Junior Counselor, from Charlotte; and many other state dignitaries.

The contest will be under the direction of Mrs. H. N. MacAllister, of Lumberton, N. C., a former member of the Elon College faculty of Music. She is the State Contest Chairman, and will find herself at home when the Contest convenes at Elon.

The contest begins at 10:00 A. M. and will hold its session throughout the entire morning and most of the afternoon. The piano contests will be held in the Whitley Auditorium; the voice contests will be held in the Chapel; and the violin contests will be held in the Society Hall. A dancing contest will also be held. All these events are open to the public; and all who are interested are cordially invited to attend.
