Pastor Emeritus of Greensboro Church Talks At Sunday Services

Dr. C. H. Rowland, Pastor Emeritus of the Greensboro Christian-Congregational church was guest preacher for the morning service here Sunday. Dr. Rowland used as his subject "I Seek No Favor." The speaker went on to say that many a person had been ruined by favors. More students are ruined by the favors they get in college than by the hardship they are forced to undergo.

Taking the Prodigal Son as example, Dr. Rowland, said the son at home showed a more selfish spirit than the Prodigal Son upon his return. The need of the present day is for people to have the desire to "Be A Man." Dr. Rowland used the case of Abraham and Lot to illustrate his point. Lot was looking for favors, while Abraham was man enough to face the issues as they came. When time came to settle and divide the property, Lot asked for the lowland, the best grazing, while Abraham took the hills. Abraham won for himself a prominent place in the Bible, while Lot played an unimportant part.

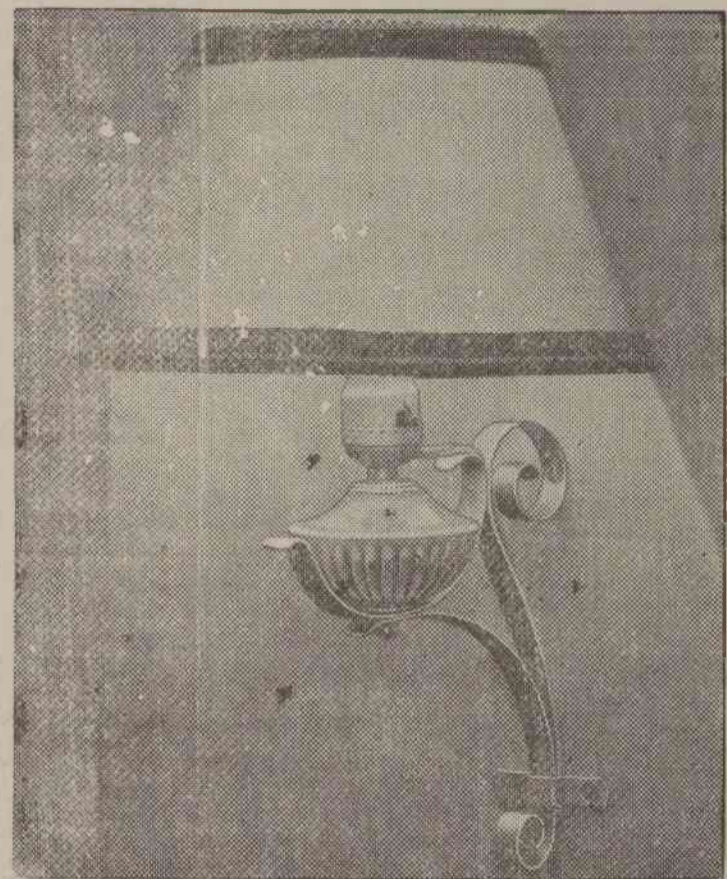

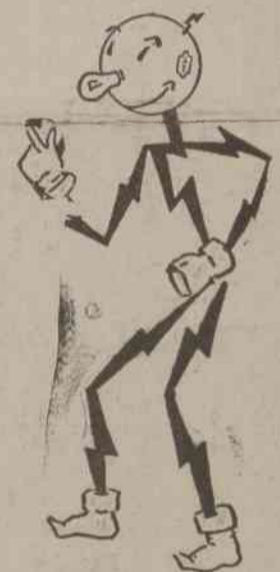
The members of the society are improving in their attempts to speak before an audience and are to be commended for the fine work they are doing.



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
