Roosevelt Elected In Campus Straw Vote

Polled Four-Fifth Of
The 296 Votes Cast

Elon students went to the polls and elected President Roosevelt on their straw-vote choice, at Chapel Wednesday. President Roosevelt polled 225 of the 296 votes that were cast by students and faculty members of Elon.

Landon finished a poor second. He polled 54 of the 296 votes. Browder, the Communistic candidate, polled seven votes; Lemke, Unionist, six votes; Thomas, Socialist, received four votes and Calvin, Prohibition, polled none.

Medical Aptitude Student Christian Test To Be Given Committee To Emphasis Peace

A One Dollar Fee Is Required From Each Applicant

Test December 4th

Every year the Association of American Medical Colleges give the Medical Aptitude Tests to prospective medical students. Approximately 90 per cent of the approved medical schools use the results of these tests as one factor in the selection of their students. Last year seven students took this test.

This year the test is to be given at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of December 4th and is to last approximately one hour and forty five minutes. A fee of one dollar from each applicant is required to defray the expenses of the examination. Since this examination is one of the normal requirements of the majority of the medical schools, any student planning to enter medical college in the fall of 1937 should arrange to take this test. It is not necessary for the student to have completed a pre-federal work before the test provided the work will be completed before the test is given only once a year.

Any student desiring to take this test should get in touch with Dr. Burrows as soon as possible so that the Association can be informed in time to send the necessary number of tests.
