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This first issue of the college year marks the beginning of a new phase in the history of MAROON AND GOLD. At regular weekly intervals during the year, this good old college paper will be published by students in Journalism 61-62. They are to do all the reporting and editing, and some of the printing. On Thursdays and Fridays, therefore, our readers may happen to see and hear the Elon Press grinding out current issues. Lawrence Farrell, who was elected editor last Spring, has decided to sever his connection with the paper because of his unusually heavy burden of college courses. We shall miss his assistance, but we hope to carry on without him the traditions of Elon College and its newspaper.

While the acceptance of responsibility by the class in Journalism means that no single person is likely to be overburdened, as frequently happened to the elected but soon neglected editors of former years, we nevertheless feel the urge to reiterate the old truism that no student enterprise can succeed without the support of the entire college community. The MAROON AND GOLD this year will be more than ever the voice of the people, if the people (and we mean you) pipe up with otherwise obscure news and opinion. In other words, this paper is not the exclusive property of the present staff of editors, but is in several ways the product of your Elon. News items and other communications should be slipped under the door of the press room in the Science Building not later than Tuesday mornings if they are to be printed in the Saturday editions.

Our editorial policy is something which must grow with our experience. At the outset we have only two important ambitions: to print real news, not just a rehash of what every reader already knows, and to report the antics of the college community as history worthy of permanent record. We hope you feel the same way.

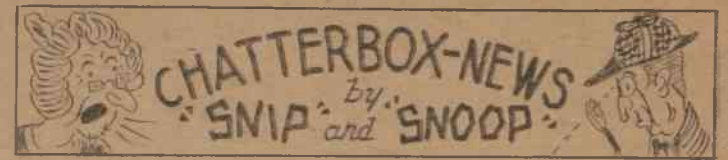

Waitus Woodward Howell comes back to Elon after a year's absence. Mr. Howell received his degree from Elon and has done graduate work at the University of North Carolina. He has had ten years' experience in the field of bookkeeping, typing and accounting. We are glad to have Mr. Howell back with us as Associate Professor of Business Administration.

Mr. George Beecher is the new Associate Professor in Education. He will also have supervision of the extension course in education that is to be given in Burlington this fall and winter. Mr. Beecher received the A. B. degree from Yale in 1928, and has also done graduate work in that institution. He has taken work also at the University of Louisville, at the Linguistic Institute in New York, and at the American Academy in Rome. Mr. Beecher taught for a while in Kentucky and later taught in Arundel, West Virginia. This school is known as a re-orientation Administration project. It was something new along the lines of progressive education. Mr. Beecher says, "I am glad to be in Elon". He further says, "I have never seen such an opportunity for doing work along lines of progressive education in the county as well as in the College." Mr. Beecher is to give extension courses for teachers in service in Alamance County, in addition to his courses here at the college.
