### EASTER SERVICES CONDUCTED PROGRAM OF

President Smith Will Lecture On "Life Of Jesus Christ'

Commemoration of Holy Week has been kept by prayer and communion services, and will be terminated by the Easter Sunday observance at eleven o'clock in Whitley Auditorium.

The nation has ben cautioned to prepare for a sober and prayerful observance of the day of victory in Europe, and for a continuation of effort in subduing Japan. This year's period of sacred religious services in worship of the Master have therefore an unusual significance.

As a part of this program, President L. E. Smith will present an illustrated lecture on Friday evening March 30. The address will concern the "Life of Christ" and the Holy

Last year Dr. Smith gave a beautiful discourse with illustrations from Oberammergau, scene of the dramatic presentation of the "Passion Play" by Bavarian peasants and villagers. Friday evening's lecture will be a continuation of the story with travel illustrations concerning Palestine.
