the G. I. Bill of Rights may take the course with expenses paid under the provisions established by federal legislation. Civilian pilot license may be obtained upon completon of the work.

Facilites available are the same ones which were extensively used for Air Corps trainees during the war. Instruction will be given in the college by Professor A. L. Hook, head of the Department of Physics at Elon and licensed pilot, former president of the Physics Division of North Carolina Academy of Sciences. Flying instructors at the Burlington airport are C. H. Jordan and Henry Warf, both of competent experience. Further expansion of the program is contempland by the joint management. The report from the Veterans' Ad-

ministration reads in part: "The Burlington Flying Service and Elon College have been jointly approved as an institution for training in aviation . . . In the event vet-

erans desire training in aviation and the Burlington Flying Services furnishes this instruction as an extension of the laboratory facilities of your institution . . . and if Elon College allows full credit for such a course, approves the content of it, and supervises the instruction, the course may be considered as meeting the requirements of Public Law 346, 78th Congress, and payments for it within established limitations will be made in conformity with the usual procedure.

It is believed that Elon is the first college in the state to be granted this approval. College and university practice now is to enroll veterans at any time during an academic term or quarter, provided that suitable arrangements are made through the dean of instruction.
