Watson and his new staff will begin their duties with publication of the last two issues of the current school year, which will appear April 26 and May 17.

The new editor succeeds Al Burlingame, of Cambridge, N. Y., who will remain in an advisory capacity until the end of the quarter. The MAROON AND GOLD will not be published during the summer months.

Watson, besides his experience with the mechanical end of the newspaper business, also has written numerous articles and stories for the M. & G. during his year as press operator. He is an English major and well qualified to edit next year's paper.

Other persons will be added to the staff as soon as the new editor can interview available talent.
