The Fighting Christians of Elon College ran rough house over Sanford on the latter's field last Friday, April 9, defeating the Spinners 16-3.

Frank Roberts and C. K. Siler combined mound duties to scatter eleven hits. The Fighting Christians pounded three Sanford pitchers unmercifully for thirteen hits and a big seven run ninth inning to complete the humiliation
