The first meeting will be presided over by Don Kernodle, the President of the Student Body, until the class president is duly elected. The officers to be elected at this first meeting are as follows: President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer.

In keeping with the rules of Elon College, a freshman who aspires to office-holding, must have attained a "C" average in high school. Eligibility lists are being compiled by Professor Hook and his staff in the Registrar's office and will be posted in ample time for the freshmen to

acquire themselves with the fitness of their prospective nominees. This will eliminate much confusion in the election.

The second meeting will be held two days later, on the seventh of October for the election of representatives to the Student Congress. The Congress is the major governing body, composed of representatives from each class, the Men's Council, the Women's Council, and officers of the Student Body. The posts of representatives require also a certain scholastic average for nomination and election.

Both of these meetings will be held in Whitley Auditorium at ten a. m. All freshmen are urged to attend in the interest of hotly-contested politics.

Republican Sim Delapp First Speaker Sept. 27

Arrangements have been completed with state secretaries of the Republican, Democratic and Progressive parties for the appearance of representative speakers at Elon under the sponsorship of the campus chapter of the International Relations Club, according to an announcement made this week by IRC corresponding secretary Marshall Mace.

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Efforts are being made this week to contact Col. Philip S. Finn, Jr., state chairman of the States' Rights Democratic Party, to secure speaker representation for the Dixiecrats. Headquarters of North Carolina's States' Rights Party is in Hendersonville.

A definite date has been set for the appearance of Sim DeLapp, state Republican party chairman, on Monday night, Sept. 27, at 7:00 p. m.

### First Speaker

Miss Mary Price, state chairman of the Progressive Party, is slated to speak Oct. 11.

The Democratic Party speaker has not been determined, according to Mr. Mace. It is hoped, he says, that Capus Waynick, state party chairman, will be the speaker.

### Campus IRC

The IRC is young on the Elon campus. It was formed in the college year 1946-47, under the sponsorship of Dr. Hans Hirsch. Dr. Hirsch has continued as sponsor to the present.

Alton Wright, the first campus IRC president, served in 1946-47 and 1947-48. President this year is Baxter Twitty.

As Mr. Mace explains it, the IRC is open to faculty as well as students. Too, the public is invited to attend all speakers' programs.

### IRC Sponsored By Carnegie

#### Endowment

All IRC clubs are sponsored by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace, which serves individual clubs in an advisory capacity.

Nicholas Murray Butler, President Emeritus of the Carnegie Endowment, has this to say about the Endowment's endeavor to promote world peace:

"The purpose of the Carnegie Endowment in undertaking this work is to instruct and to enlighten public opinion. It is not to support exclusively any one view as to how best to treat the conditions which now prevail throughout the world, but to fix the attention of students on those underlying principles of international conduct, of international law, and of international organization which must be agreed upon and put into action if a peaceful civilization is to continue."
