Nearly four hundred Elon College students invaded Burlington and other Alamance County centers last Wednesday, November 1 for a gigantic bellringing and door-knocking campaign, which inaugurated a drive for \$100,000 to complete the new Alumni Memorial Gymnasium.

The big one-day drive by the students got the campaign off to an excellent start, unofficial figures for the day showing nearly \$3,000 in cash and pledges raised. Many people were not at home, and others requested the students to return later in the week. Volunteers then continued the campaign through Saturday, and indications were that the student effort would net better than \$4,000

This figure fell far short of the \$100,000 needed, but directors of the campaign had not expected the students to raise the entire amount. The greater part of the big goal was expected to fall on the shoulders of special groups, which have been conducting their own drives.
