Pehearsals for this play will get underway upon return from spring vacation, and it will be presented on Whitley stage about the middle of April.

The action of "Papa Is All" centers around the life of a Mennonite family in the Pennsylvania Dutch settlements, in which a rigidly religious father uses his religious beliefs as a whiplash to keep his family in order. It will offer an interesting picture of family life, in which all modern conveniences are passed up while the family money is invested in land and cattle. Singers To Offer Eleven

Thirty-two members of the Choir are slated to make the long jaunt northward, traveling by chartered bus. They will be accompanied by Prof. John Westmoreland, who will direct the singers in their programs, and by Prof. Fletcher Moore, who will serve as accompanist for the group in a total of eleven concerts.

The first engagement for the Elon Singers will be at South Boston, Va., where they are to sing on Friday evening, February 29th. This is the first of a total of eleven appearances in four eastern and northern states and in the District of Columbia.

The group will sing in Windsor, Va., on Saturday evening, March 1st, followed by three concerts on Sunday, March 2nd. The three Sunday appearances will be in Holland, Va., in the morning, at Suffolk, Va., in the afternoon and at Newport News. Va., in the evening. The Choir has sung frequently in these Virginia cities
