Elon Upset By Pirates In 14-6 Tilt

Upset victims for the third consecutive weekend, the Elon Christians went down fighting last Saturday night before an invading crew of Pirates from East Carolina, who rallied in the final quarter for two quick touchdown thrusts and a 14 to 6 victory over the home-standing Elon eleven.

The Christians dominated the game much of the way after scoring a lone touchdown in the opening minutes of the second quarter, but the flying feet of Bob Perry proved poison to the Elon hopes in the fourth quarter as the speedy Pirate halfback dashed 22 and 43 yards for touchdowns that won the game.

The maroon-jerseyed Elon outfit started a drive late in the first period on its own 43-yard line, and Charlie Maidon passed to Tony Carcaterra and Bob McLean for key plays on the drive that ended with Joe DelGais bucking over from the one for a touchdown after 1:40 of the second quarter. A plunge for the two-pointer failed, but Elon had a 6-0 lead.

The Christians carried that 6-0 margin with them to the dressing rooms at the half-time, and throughout the third quarter they protected that lead with a stone-wall defense that never allowed the Pirates to get in threatening position. Then came the "break" that cost the Christians the game.

The Pirates were backed up on their own thirty-nine, second down and eleven to go, when Ralph Zehring uncorked a long pass to end Bill Cain. The pass was not close, but the official's whistle tooted to signify an interference penalty which gave East Carolina first-and-ten on the Elon twenty-two. From there Bob Perry circled right end on a pitch-out for the tying TD, and Zehring passed to Bill Cain for the twin points and an 8 to 6 margin.

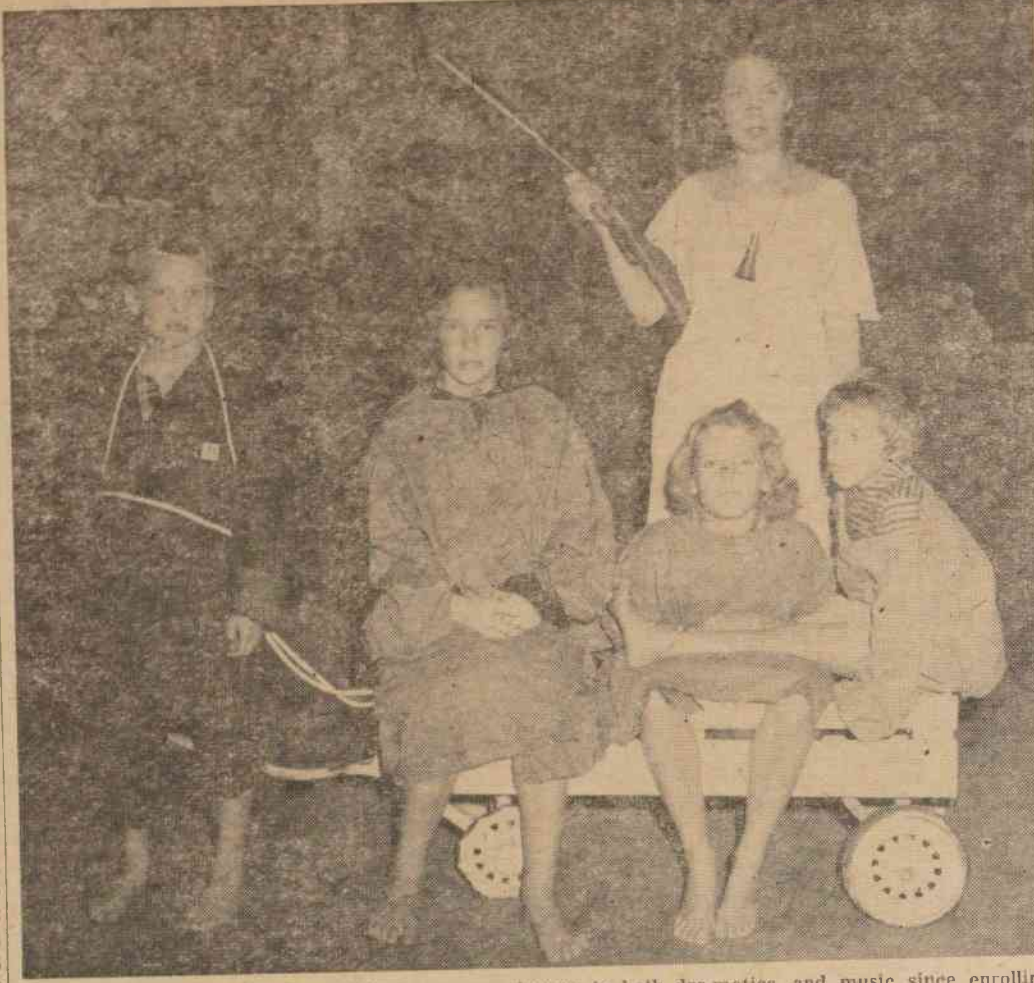
Rebounding sharply, the Christians took the next kick-off on their own twenty-seven and rode quickly down field to the East Carolina 24-yard marker, mainly on the throwing of Charlie Maidon, who completed four consecutive passes before going out with an injury. The Elon drive faltered on a fourth-down try, and the Pirates took over on their own twenty-four.

At that point Randall Holmes lofted a tremendous 62-yard punt out of bounds on the Elon six, and the Christians had to kick back. The Pirates received on the Elon forty-four, and three plays later the speedy Perry was gone again. 43 yards this time on a counter play that carried into pay dirt. The try-for-points failed, but the Pirates had sacked the game by a 14 to 6 count.

punt to the Elon forty-six, Maidon passed to Harold Austin for ten and to Tony Carcaterra for 44 yards for the touchdown. Bob McLean was stopped on the try-for-point, and Appalachian still lead 26 to 12. A second Elon bid for a TD in that period was halted by a pass interception on the Mountaineer fifteen.

The final Mountaineer score came when Jim Edwards plunged from the one to top a 52-yard drive, running the score to 32-12, but this fired the Christians for the final effort after the ensuing kick-off. Bob McLean returned the kick 21 yards to the Elon thirty-one, and Charlie Maidon mixed five straight pass completions with a pair of nice runs as the Christians swept over the goal. The scoring play was a 7-yard aerial from Maidon to Carcaterra. Maidon plunged for the points that made it Appalachian 32, Elon 20.

Former Elon Student Dies In Hotel Fall

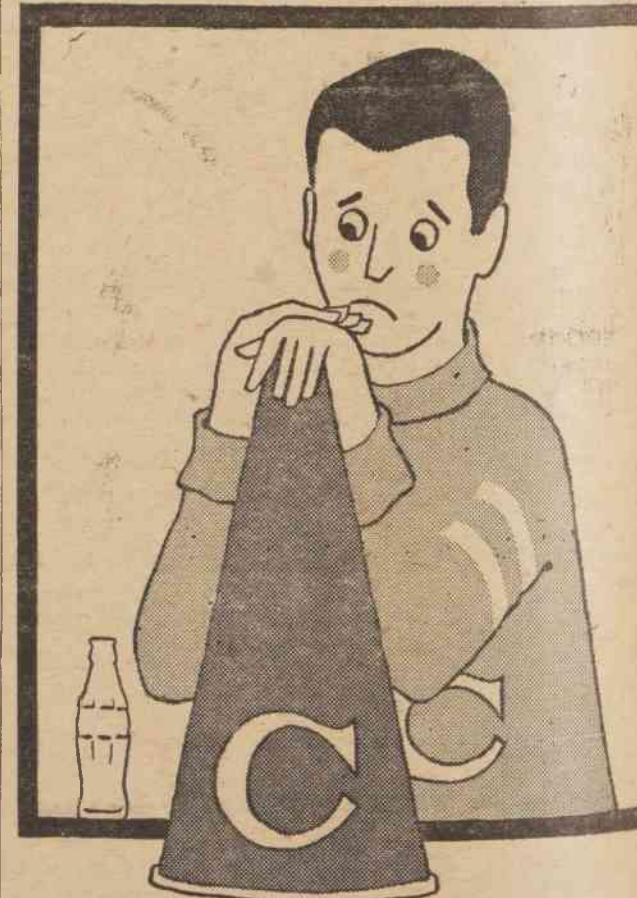
Jimmy Lee Curles, 24, a United States Air Force enlistee, who from Ca-Vel near Roxboro, who attended Elon as a freshman during the 1956-57 term, was killed in a fall or plunge from the eleventh floor of Francis Marion Hotel in Charleston, S. C., on Wednesday of last week.

A witness of his death stated that he "sort of sailed through a window . . . sort of, and dropped like a rock." Another witness said, "You could hear him screaming as he fell." His body smashed into a cornice and jacked back onto a one-story roof.

Chief William F. Kelly, of the Charleston Police Department, said Curles' roommate at the hotel, identified as John Edward Gelata, 23, of Harrisburg, Pa., was being held as a material witness in the investigation of the youth's death. He stated that no charges had been made against Gelata.

The two airmen had just returned the day before to the Charleston Air Force Base after serving with the Air Force in Saudi Arabia and had been given 33 days leave. The hotel manager stated that they had checked into the hotel on Tuesday and that there had been no disturbance reported from their room.

Young Curles was a member of the Elon Band and also of Sigma Mu Sigma Fraternity during the year he was a student here.
