Phillips, missionaries for the American Board in Africa for forty years, were guests on the Elon campus last weekend when Dr. Phillips spoke at the 11 o'clock services on Sunday morning in Whitley Auditorium. At the same time his wife was speaking in Greensboro. The two missionaries, who are now visiting throughout the Southern Convention of Congregational Christian Churches, were then honored at a reception hold in the McEwen Banquet Hall on Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Phillips climaxed his long missionary service by being elected moderator of the General Counoil of Congregational Christian Churches. His work in South Africa featured direction of the Jan H. Hofmeyre School of Social Work in Johannesburg from 1940 until his departure for America. His wife worked with a hospital, a home for delinquent girls, the Holmeyre School, the Girl Guides, the YWCA and other organizations and Institutions.
