

Elon Campus Government Gets Outstanding Awards

A dream and desire of many years came true for Elon College student government leaders when the Elon Student Government Association was named the outstanding group in the North State Student

Government Association at the statewide meeting of the North State group held on the Elon campus on Friday and Saturday, April 20th and 21st.

For many years interested leaders and members of the Elon Student Government Association have been working hard to win the award, which is given annually by the North State organization, and the goal was finally achieved when David Peebles, NSSGA president, called Elon's Jim Buie to the head table at the banquet held at Holiday Inn on Sunday, April 21st, and presented the award for the outstanding student government of 1963.

The award was given after oral and written reports were made to the Association's officers and after each delegation from the ten member colleges was judged on its SGA display and its participation in the spring conference. Both the oral and written reports from Elon went over well. In regard to participation in the conference, Elon led the association. The revised constitution was a pet topic for the Elon delegates, and the Elon group also had two candidates for associational offices. Those who saw Elon's display were impressed by the work that had gone into it.

When asked about the award, President Buie said, "We are very proud of this award, but it would not be on our campus today if it were not for the cooperation of every student in the Student Body. They make the Student Government, and it is their award."

In addition to the campus-wide award, Elon also scored another honor when Bill Whittenton, a junior from Reidsville, who was an unsuccessful candidate for the Elon SGA presidency in the recent election, was elected as president of the North State Student Government Association by delegates of the ten member colleges.

Whittenton had held the office of vice-president of the NSSGA since the winter meeting in February, when he was elected after resignation of the regularly-elected vice-president. He had served as coordinator for the annual spring conference here and was chairman of the constitutional revision committee.

During his term as president Whittenton will visit the member colleges of the Association to help them with their various problems. He will also attempt to attract other colleges in North Carolina to join the Association in an effort to strengthen both the organization itself and the member schools.

Two Students Injured In Burlington Accident

Two Elon College students were seriously injured in the early hours of Saturday, April 20th, when their car went out of control and crashed into a wooden bridge in the yard of a private home at the intersection

of West Front Street and East Wilkesboro Drive in Burlington.

William Milligan, 22, an Elon junior from Ocean Grove, N. J., and Thomas Breeze, also 22, of Johnson City, N. Y., have both been in serious condition since the accident, with Milligan a patient at the North Carolina Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill and Breeze a patient at the Memorial Hospital of Alamance County in Burlington.

The accident occurred at 12:50 o'clock on the morning of April 20th when the car, driven by Milligan, jumped a curb and travelled 77 feet across the yard of a home at 1021 West Front Street before smashing into the timbers of the wooden bridge.

The impact drove the motor of the car under the bridge, and ends of the timbers that formed the floor of the bridge crashed through the windshield into the front seat that was occupied by the two students. Persons at the scene stated that Milligan, the driver, was pinned so tightly against the back of the seat that it required 30 minutes to get him free. Breeze was also pinned by the ends of the boards, but he was removed from the wreck more quickly.

Milligan was rushed as quickly as possible to the North Carolina Memorial Hospital at Chapel Hill, where his condition was listed as critical by hospital authorities. A group of 30 Elon students went to Chapel Hill later that day to give blood for Milligan, who had critical head injuries. Reports from Chapel Hill this week were that Milligan is still in a coma as a result of his hurts.

Breeze was carried to the Memorial Hospital in Burlington, where it was reported that he had suffered multiple fractures, a collapsed lung and multiple lacerations and contusions. He has since undergone surgery for his injuries, and reports this week were that he was showing improvement.

Police who investigated the accident stated that there were no skid marks, although they estimated the speed of the car at about 55 miles per hour at the time of the accident. The car itself was reported to be a total loss, and it was estimated that there were \$250 damages to the bridge.

Arts Forum Has Golden As Speaker

Harry Golden, of Charlotte, editor and publisher of the "Carolina Israelite" and author of a number of popular books in recent years, was a guest speaker in Whitley Auditorium on the Elon College campus at 8 o'clock Monday night, appearing under the sponsorship of the Liberal Arts Forum, which is a student organization.

The speaker is a native of New York City, who taught school briefly before embarking on a newspaper career on New York papers. He settled in Charlotte in 1942 and two years later established the "Carolina Israelite," which has grown from an initial circulation of 400 to its present nearly 50,000 subscribers throughout the nation and abroad.

Golden first gained attention as an author with the publication of "Only In America" in 1958. This book of essays on American life was followed by "For 2c Plain" in 1959 and "Enjoy! Enjoy!" in 1960. His "Only In America" has sold well over two million copies, and both the later volumes have had wide circulation.

Elon Loses To Catawba

The Catawba Indians used three singles, along with three walks and three Elon errors, to plate six runs in a big seventh inning here on Monday, April 8th, and the Catawba nine went on to chalk a decisive 7 to 2 victory over the Fighting Christian baseballers in a Carolinas Conference game.

Roy Erlandsen, tiny Elon right-hander, was rolling along with a fine mound job for the first six racks, having allowed only three hits as he blanked the Indians until the disastrous seventh. In that frame Erlandsen lost his control and suffered from Elon errors as twelve Catawba batters pranced to the plate.

Gary Taylor, Elon's freshman second sacker, had plated both the Elon markers with a two-run homer in the third, but that was the only effective attack shown by the Christians. Andy Peretin, Catawba catcher, hit a singleton circuit blow in the eighth off relief hurler Jerry Drake.

Student Senate In Final Session

The Student Senate, at its final meeting of the 1963-64 term on Wednesday night, April 24th, appropriated a total of \$1,600 for various purposes. The first bill to come through, written and introduced by Senator Melvin Shreve, set aside \$100 toward publication of The Collegian, campus literary magazine.

A second bill, introduced by President Jim Buie, appropriated \$1,000 toward renovation of the tennis courts. The students had approved such a move at a poll taken along with the Senatorial elections, but it passed by only a 13 to 5 vote in the Senate.

The Liberal Arts Forum was voted \$525 for expenses of the program on Monday night, which featured Harry Golden, editor of the Carolina Israelite, the bill being written by President Buie. A final piece of legislation expressed admiration for and appreciation to Lynn Ryals, who had served as president of the Senate the year.

The clinic was staged under the sponsorship of Elon College's department of psychology and education and under the direction of Dr. C. Strauch, chairman of the department. Those who participated from the three local schools systems were a selected group of teachers from the middle and upper elementary grades.

Miss Horsman, who conducted the clinic, offered her hearers a broad background in the field of reading instruction. A native of Toronto, Canada, she was educated at Edinboro State Teachers College in Pennsylvania and at the University of Michigan. After teaching experience in Pennsylvania schools, she became a reading consultant for Scott, Foresman and Company, textbook publishers, and taught in summer sessions at a number of large universities.

Now serving as director of a special program for teaching reading skills in the Detroit City Schools, she has participated in a number of national conferences on the subject and is currently a member of Dr. James B. Conant's Policy Conference on Reading Instruction. She is a co-author of a workbook, entitled "Basic Reading Skills For High School Use."
