Elon Downs Pfeiffer 3-1

The Elon Christian baseballers turned back the Pfeiffer Falcons 3 to 1 here on May 4th and climbed into the top spot in the Carolinas Conference standings. The victory over second-place Pfeiffer moved Elon up one notch, and High Point gave a helping hand by knocking off first-place Atlantic Christian to elevate Elon to the leadership.

The victory over the Falcons, which came on a fine 5-hit pitching job by southpaw Herbie Johnson, was Elon's sixth consecutive conference win and the Christians' fifteenth victory in seventeen starts. After holding only a 4-5 loop record as late as April 23rd, the Christian nine climbed from seventh to first in exactly twelve days.

Two walks and a steal of home by Herbie Johnson gave Elon her first run against Pfeiffer in the third, and the score that proved to be the winning margin then came in the sixth as Bobby Ellis saw life on a missed third strike, moved up on a walk to Comar Shields and then raced home on Gary Taylor's double. A third run in the seventh was only trimming for the victory.

With Elon holding a 3-0 lead going into the ninth, the Falcons finally broke the scoring ice when they scored a single run on an error, a walk and two singles. Johnson, who chalked his seventh win against three losses for the year, struck out thirteen men and walked only three while turning back the Falcons. No batter on either team had more than one hit, and Taylor's double was the only extra-base clout.

Group Honored For Dramatics

Six members of the Elon Players were honored with special awards this week for their work with the campus dramatic group during the 1964-65 term. The awards, still called "Eppies," were for all-round effort and not for a single performance as in past years.

Honored for technical work were Tom Jeffery, of Bethesda, Md., and Robert Modell, of Greenwich, Conn. Honored for combined technical and stage work was Tyrone Rowell, of Henderson.

Two of the outstanding members of the players, Laura Rice, of Burlington, and David Andes, of Elon, were not eligible for awards this year, since they received the top acting awards last year. The new policy of the Players makes students ineligible for repeat of the annual awards.

Elon Topples Indians 15-2

The Fighting Christian baseballers jumped on Jerry Maye, ace of the Catawba mound staff, for ten runs in the first three innings as Elon went on to trample the Indian nine 15 to 2 in a Carolinas Conference game at Salisbury on April 27th, a game halted by rain after the seventh rack.

The Elon nine opened up with a five-hit and four-run barrage in the top of the first inning, a picture of things to come, and two innings later the Christians drove Maye to the showers as they racked up six more hits and six additional runs in the top of the third.

This heavy barrage of the early innings was followed by singleton runs in the fifth and sixth, with three other scores in the seventh. Meanwhile, the Indians were held in check by Herbie Johnson, Elon southpaw, who allowed only four hits while fanning six and walking five. The Indians scored only single runs in the fourth and sixth, the latter on a solo homer by Carlton Beland.

Pete Crook paced a sixteen-hit attack by the Elon outfit, with the Christian center fielder rocketing a homer and two singles in four innings. Comar Shields had three singles for four tries, and Carlton Highsmith, Tommy Newsome and H. L. Robinson all had two hits. No Catawba player had more than one safety.

The Bulldogs hopped on the slants Richard Such for two runs in the very first inning, then they got on the tall Elon hurler for a walk, a triple and two singles before he could get a single out. The result was two runs before Such settled down and struck out three men to retire the side.

The Elon nine fought back and had eight runners stranded on the sacks before the Christians finally plated their single marker in the eighth on a walk, a single and a fielder's choice.

Pete Crook was the only Elon batter to hit twice, while Hale Owens and Dollar all had two safeties for the Bulldogs. Such fanned nine and shut the visitors away from the plate after that first frame, but the damage was done early.

Davis Leads Elon Batters For Season

Art Davis, senior first sacker, paced the batting for the Elon Christians as the Christian baseballers wound up their 1965 diamond season with a mark of 23 wins and 12 losses, finishing as runner-up to the High Point Panthers in the Conference tournament.

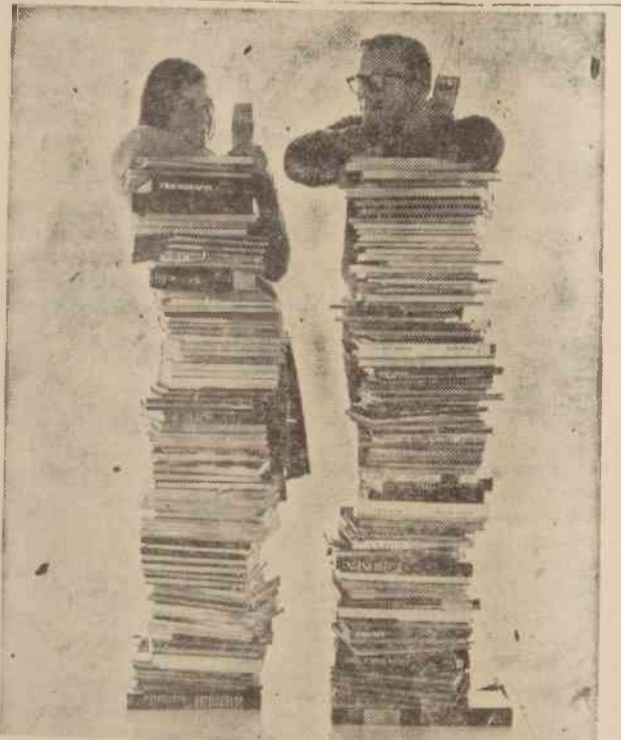
The Christian batting leader has driven out 50 hits in 133 times at bat for a .376 average while playing in all except one of Elon's 35 games. His hits included one homer, two triples and six doubles, and he shows 23 runs batted in, which was good enough to tie with Fred Stewart for the RBI leadership for the season. Davis also topped the RBI column last spring.

Richard Such topped the Christian pitchers in the win-loss column with seven wins and two losses, pushed closely by Herbie Johnson with an 8-3 mark. Other pitchers and their marks were Lefty Everett and Larry Collins, each with 3-2 records. Owen Shields with a 2-0 mark and Burgin Beale with an 0-3 record.

Johnson had the best earned run average by a scant margin of one-hundredth of a point. The ERA's for the leaders were Johnson with 1.83, Collins with a 1.84 and Such with a 1.86 mark. Other pitchers and their ERA marks were Shields with 2.43, Everett with 2.51 and Beale with 2.82 averages.
