Tietell Talks About Taxes, Philanthropy

Church Editor Visits Campus Last Weekend

Dr. J. Martin Bailey, of New York City, who is editor of "The United Church Herald," spent four days here at Elon College and in this area last week, following a number of speaking engagements here and renewing acquaintance with United Church of Christ activities in North Carolina.

After arriving at the Greensboro - High Point Airport on Wednesday of last week, he came immediately to Elon College, where he spoke in chapel services on both Thursday and Friday mornings.

He also met with several college groups, including the United Church of Christ Fellowship and the ministerial and religious education majors who are members of the Mathatians. He also spoke to the members of the journalism class last Friday.

Along with his visit to Elon, Dr. Bailey also visited Catawba College at Salisbury and the Elon Home for Children, both of which are operated under the auspices of the United Church of Christ.

On the entertainment side, Dr. Bailey also attended a presentation of the Elon Player show

"Waiting For Godot," on Friday night and the Elon-Guilford basketball game on Saturday night.

After an informal meeting with area ministers and their wives on Saturday afternoon, Dr. Bailey spoke at the Elon College Community Church last Sunday morning.

Conrad Tietell, of New York City, considered one of the foremost tax experts in the United States, was a visitor on the Elon campus some days ago when he spoke to the Elon trustees and to a group of business and industrial leaders of this area concerning the relations of taxes to private Philanthropy in the field of higher education.

The visit of the nationally known tax counsellor was in connection with a workshop designed as a preliminary to a capital fund drive, which is planned by and for Elon College in the immediate future, a campaign designed to eventually raise \$7,000,000 for college endowment and improvements.

Tietell first spoke to the members of the Elon College board of trustees on his visit here, talked at a workshop meeting in the afternoon to which about 100 persons, including bankers, public accountants, insurance representatives and tax consultants had been invited. He also talked at a dinner meeting that night in McEwen Dining Hall.

The visit of the New York tax expert marked the first big step in the projected E-4 Fund drive, and it followed the appointment of Allen E. Gant to head a special Advance Gifts Division and George D. Colclough to head a Deferred Gifts Division.

Tietell is a member of the New York law firm of Prerau and Tietell and is editor of "Taxwise Giving," a monthly charitable tax guide for the use of development officers and stewardship leaders. He is a director of the Philanthropy Tax Institute and nationally recognized as a lecturer in his field.

He also holds membership in national organizations of higher education and is a consultant on Taxation and Philanthropy for the American College Public Relations Association.

PACE Offers Financial Aid To Students

The State Department of Public Welfare, through its Division of Special Services and in cooperation with institutions of higher learning in North Carolina, has developed a college work-study program for students who are beginning or continuing their higher education in North Carolina. The program is called PACE - I.N.C., with the letters of the abbreviated title meaning "Plan Assuring College Education In North Carolina."

The PACE program enables students to secure summer employment through off campus work-study funds available under the Higher Education Act of 1965. Students, if certified by the financial officers of a participating college, may work for a home town public or private non-profit agency or organization during the summer.

The PACE plan was developed by the community services consultant program of the Division of Special Services in 1965. In the summer of 1967 the PACE program placed 1,878 students in 94 counties in North Carolina and in 859 different agencies or organizations. There were 47 colleges participating in the plan last summer.

Duvall Is Newcomer In Social Sciences

A newcomer on the Elon academic scene this year, who has already made a fine contribution to the campus, is Dr. Sylvanus M. Duvall, a semi-retired professor who likes to keep his hand in the teaching profession.

Dr. Duvall is technically retired after many years as a member of the faculty at George Williams College in Chicago, but he came to Elon to do part-time teaching in the field of social science this year, because he declares, "This is no time to retire. It is too exciting."

In his role as a part-time member of the Elon faculty, he taught one class in contemporary problems during the past fall semester, and he is again teaching a single class this spring. His students do much work on their own in studying the present day problems of American society. At the same time, Dr. Duvall himself is spending much time in research in his field.

He and his wife, Dr. Evelyn Mills Duvall, live in the College Garden Apartments. Both he and his wife are the authors of widely used texts and reference books on family life, and both have had worldwide experience in the subject of family relations.

Together they were consultants on family life at the East Asia Conference in Manila in 1954, and this was followed by similar conferences in Ceylon, India, Egypt and Lebanon.

In 1961 they served as co-chairmen of the National Conference on Church and Family, sponsored by the National Council of Churches and the Canadian Council of Churches. In 1966 and 1967 they worked for several months in the area of family life with the New Zealand Department of Justice. They have also conducted short conferences in Hong Kong, Sidney, Australia, and in Manila in the Phillipines.

Dr. Duvall is a native of Syracuse, N.Y. He holds the A. B. degree from Syracuse University, the B.D. and S.T. M. degrees from the Union Theological Seminary, and the M.A. and Ph. D. degrees from Columbia University.

In addition to his teaching work at George Williams College, he has also taught at Scarritt College in Nashville, Tenn., and has taught summer courses in a number of colleges and universities in all parts of the United States.
