As this issue of the Maroon and Gold hits the campus and brings this column to the readers, two nights of the big tournament will have already been played, and four of the eight teams who won berths in the annual meet will have bitten the dust of defear.

There's one satisfaction, however, and that is that our Fighting Christians were there in the first round to put up a fight for the laurels. Results of that first game are unknown at this writing, but let us hope that we'll still have the Maroon and Gold bucketeers on hand for the semifinals tonight.

Our friends, the Quakers of Guilford, entered the tournament as the favorites for the title, having displayed tremendous scoring and rebounding power throughout the season, paced by such stars as big Bob Kauffman, Pat Moriarity, Ed Fellers and others. In fact, the Quakers have been ranked among the top ten reams in

the national small-college ranks and have brought much attention to our Conference.

Other teams which battled for first division spots through most of the season have been Catawba, Western Carolina, Lenoir Rhyne and Atlantic Christian, and as this column was written it was still undecided as to which three of the group would join with Guilford to make the top four teams in the tournament pairings.

The High Point, Appa-lachian and Elon squads were already in the tournament as the final week of regular-season play began, but there had been a time during the season when it appeared that our Christian cagers might miss the tournament for the first time in history. They dropped seven in a row to Conference opponents before they could get started, but they then put together six wins in seven starts to move into the select eight teams that entered the tournament eliminations.

As a matter of fact, only the first and second spots in regular season are of value as the tourney starts. The two top teams automatically go into separate upper and lower brackets, and the other teams had to draw for positions at the pairings meeting held last Sunday.

The third and fourth teams had to draw to see which would be bracketed with the first ranking team and which would go into the bracket with the second club. Once the top four teams were placed, the other four teams were drawn to determine first-round pairings. Under (Continued on page 4)

The Elon College wrestling team dropped a hardfought 21 to 15 decision to the Carolina Freshmen in Elon's Alumni Memorial Gymnasium on Saturday afternoon, February 17th, closing out Elon's first mat season with a record of four wins and three losses.

Buster Alston and Emery Moore each won decisions for the Christians, and Gary Dean and David Oliphant got forfeits for Elon's other wins. The Carolina outfit, with one of its strongest teams in recent years, gained three falls and two decisions.

This meet marked the close of a campaign during which the Christian matmen chalked victor-

ies over Guilford twice, over the Methodist College team and over N.C. State. Losses were to Pembroke, Duke and the Carolina Freshmen.
