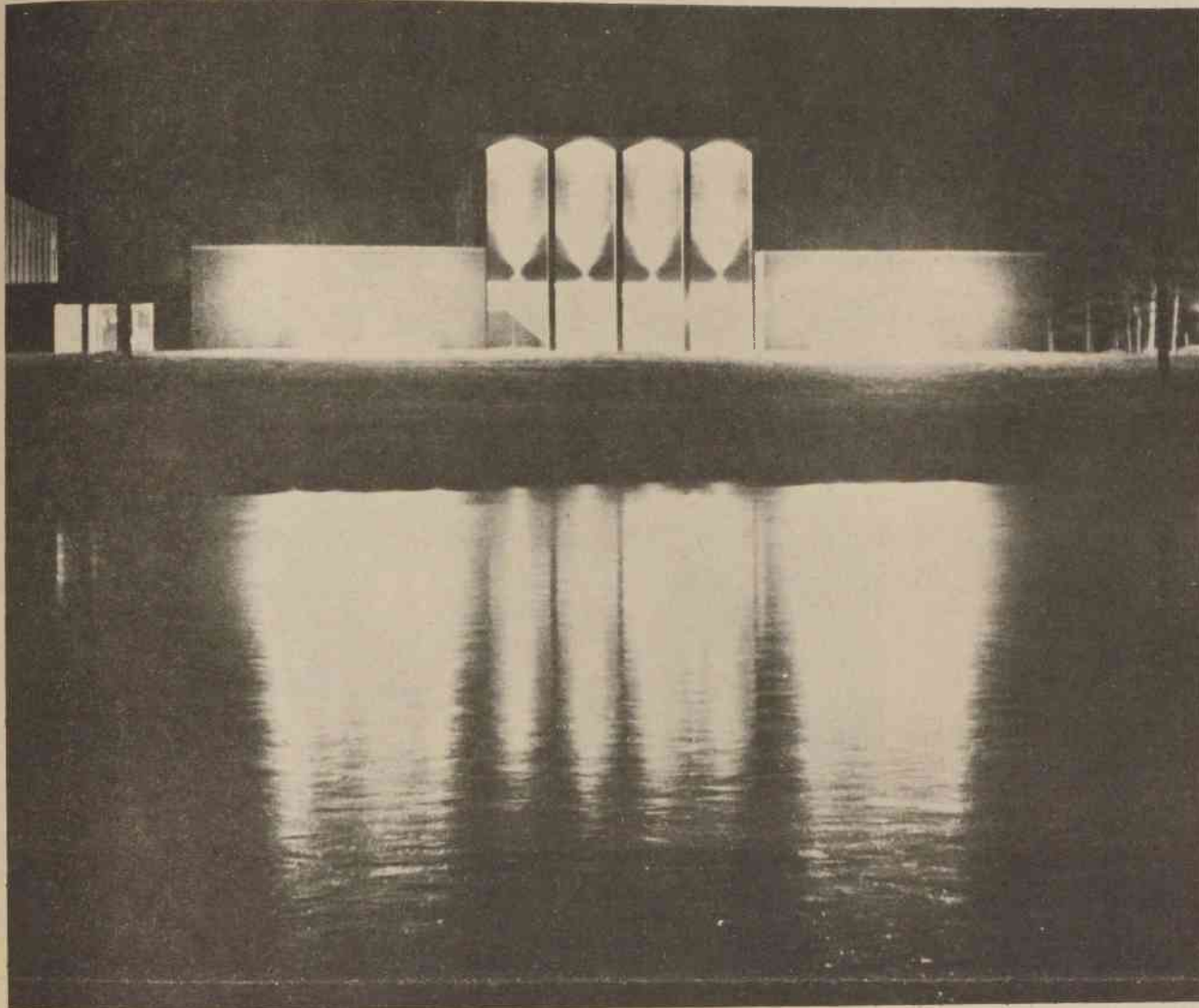


## BEAUTIFUL NIGHT VIEW OF ELON'S NEW LIVING-DINING COMPLEX

## Dr. Distler, Consultant, Visits Elon

Dr. Theodore Distler, President Emeritus of the Association of American Colleges, has just concluded a three-day visit on the campus of Elon College, where he served as an administrative consultant under sponsorship of the national college group.

Such administrative consultant service is available to all institutions which are members of the Association of American Colleges and is supported by a grant of funds from the Lilly Endowment. There is no charge to the member institutions.

Dr. Distler had previously visited the Elon College campus in 1960 when he spoke at the Founders' Day Convocations and met with the Elon Board of Trustees. On this visit just completed, he noted the great progress in the nine-year period.

He expressed pleasure at the nine-year progress in the Elon academic program, the organization and effectiveness of the administrative team and the development of Elon's physical plant. Along with the compliments for the progress, he also discussed Elon's plans and efforts for further improvement which are now underway.

Dr. Distler, who was formerly a member of the faculty at New York University, dean at Lafayette College and president of Franklin-Marshall College, was for eleven years executive director of the Association of American Colleges. He holds 36 honorary doctorates from colleges and universities.

In addition to Dr. Distler, other educators who have served as consultants at Elon College have included Dr. Guy Snively, president emeritus of Birmingham-Southern College; Dr. Goodrich White, chancellor of Emory University; and Dr. Thomas Jones, former president of Earlham College.

## 'Mini-Term' Closes ; Spring Term Begins

The first "Mini-Term" in Elon history comes to an end today, with the Elon administration, faculty and about 1,300 Elon students closing an experiment in academics which most persons have called a success.

The "Mini-Term" has been a four-weeks mid-winter session that got underway with registration on Monday, January 13th, and with its first classes being held on Tuesday, January 14th. The last classes and the final exams are being held

today. This close-out of the winter program sets the stage for the opening of the college's new 4-months spring term next week. Registration for the spring term is to be held on Monday of next week, with the initial classes to be held next Tuesday, February 11th.
