

Trustees to meet Wednesday

"Access to the board of trustees' campus life committee for the average student, faculty member, and administrator is through their respective elected representatives," says Dean of Student Affairs William Long.

There is no set procedure for a student to meet directly with the board on a formal basis; however, there may be an open-forum meeting set up by the SGA for students to meet informally with board members, according to Dean

Long. The idea was tried two years ago, he said, and was moderately successful.

The board will be here next Wednesday to discuss the progress report on the completion of the PRIDE campaign, introduce new board members and hear the report from the president on the status of the college and the 1978-79 progress report.

Robert Baxter, vice president for legal affairs, says that the schedule for the meeting is tentative, and may be changed at the last minute.

Following lunch, the board will divide into committees to discuss various aspects of college life at Elon. These meetings will be held in the new Learning Resources Center, the library and Alamance Building.

Robin Moser of the SGA will meet with the campus life committee. Speaker of the Senate Annette Metcalf will be with the educational committee, and a representative from the business affairs office will meet with the business committee.

The campus life committee's agenda currently consists of discussions on the Harper Center Living Learning Center, the community program, the career planning project, and Robin Moser's SGA re-

Dorm governments to set policy

"You people were given no power when you were elected to this position, but you have the ability to make things happen," said Area Coordinator Frank Mianzo at the first meeting of the Elon College House Government Association. He was addressing the officers elected to

this year.

Mianzo stressed change in the dormitory government with emphasis on bringing people together. "There are people that live next door to some of you that you don't even know. Part of your job is to get these people out to

represent the dormitories for met each other," he emphasized.

He also distributed copies of the constitution, which he updated this year.

Professor Richard T. Apperson will present a faculty organ recital Sunday at 4

p.m. in Whitley Auditorium.


A native of Newport News, Va., Prof. Apperson was awarded a scholarship from the Presser Foundation of Philadelphia to work toward his bachelor's degree at Elon College. During his student years at Elon, he won first place in the statewide contest sponsored by the North Carolina Federation of Music Clubs and won first place in the Southeastern district, encompassing North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee,

Florida, Georgia, and Alabama.

After graduating from Elon College, Prof. Apperson earned the master of sacred music degree from the School of Sacred Music at Union Theological Seminary, New York City. While a graduate student at Union, he was appointed assistant organistchoirmaster at St. James Episcopal Church on Madison Avenue, New York City.

He has played many recitals in the eastern United States and has been soloist with the North Carolina Symphony.
