
April 5, Thursday, All Sophomores^{*}, All Freshman Rad. Tech. Majors^{*}, All Freshman MLT Majors^{*}, All

Elon College rates high in low tuitions

by J. King White In this day and age a quality college education has become a necessity in preparing young adults for the challenges of "the working world." With prices for everything from food to fuel constantly rising, institutions of higher learning must strive to remain affordable. To date, Elon College has one of the lowest tuition rates per student for private institutions in North Carolina — only Atlantic Christian College has a lower rate.

Student tuition fees pay for a surprisingly small portion of the amount required to ope-

rate a small college. At Elon, for example, tuition and fees account for only 60-70 percent of the funds needed to meet expenses. The other 30-40 percent has to be procured through various means, including grants, earnings from established endowment funds, and contributions from

individuals, foundations, businesses and industry. Income from these other sources is a very important factor in the quality of education the college can provide, and determines whether future tuition increases will be necessarv

The electric switching station is an advanced form of relaying calls. Giving your number to the operator each time a long-distance call is placed will be eliminated with this system. Other advantages will be the possibility of many multi-party or conference

calls and touch-tone dialing. The electric switching station (ECS) will primarily be an operations building em-ploying only two people. The ESS will route all 584-ex-changes, thereby increasing

efficiency. The completion date set by Southern Bell for this station is May 24, 1980, and all services should be changed by February 7, 1981, ac-cording to a Southern Bell technician.


