## Students meet staff as fall semester opens

Several changes in administrative staff during the summer have resulted in new faces in offices which students visit often.

Ken Harper, director of the office of administrative services and registrar, has been made assistant professor of education. Mark Albertson, assistant registrar, has become the registrar. Jerri Holloway is now assistant to the registrar.

Robert Baxter, vice president for legal affairs and associate professor of political science, has been named associate professor of business law and college attorney.

## Ma Bell to smile on 250 residents

Private telephone service for 250 rooms on campus will be provided this fall, according to Bill Sharpe, assistant dean of student affairs.

Mr. Sharpe is suggesting to students that they make a note of the following steps if they wish to take advantage of this new telephone service:

A representative of Southern Bell will be on campus Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 5, and 6, from 1 p.m.-5 p.m. at the rotunda in Alamance Building to receive applications from the room representative, that is, the student willing to accept financial responsibility for the telephone.

Before these dates, roommates should discuss who will accept financial responsibility. Southern Bell requires that only one student sign for the telephone.

Roommates may work out their own method for splitting the cost of the service to their room.

Roommates may be listed with the information operator at 60 cents each student.

If fewer than 250 applications are received, each applicant will be given a telephone. If more than 250 apply, a modified lottery will be conducted to determine recipients of telephone service.

## Changes surprise many

Returning students may marvel at changes that have been made with the campus walls since May, but they will gape at what has happened outside the campus and playing fields.

As they drive in from I-85 or U.S. 70, old-timers jerk their heads and take a second look at the vacant lot where Kappa Sig house stood, across from the post office.

Before that smooth spot registers, they come face to face with the European-look, arched, windowed Lighthouse Tavern. The great, tall doors which must have been filched from a cathedral and the copper-clad windows add another bit of class adjacent to the Priestley Fine Art Gallery.

And next to the Lighthouse, the old Blue Room alias Green Room is getting a new face and, one hears, a new function as a jazz club. Frank Grzeszczak, owner of the Lighthouse, has provided a parking area just beyond Joel Brown's renovated green, now brown, room.

On down Williamson Avenue, the students see that the car wash building has disappeared. The area is fenced, and a parking lot for the college has been developed. This was to be the site of the Southern Bell switching sta-

tion, but the college traded off the lot next to Bell and got the car-wash area to add to parking space.

The East Building, a former Middle School on East Haggard did not come up to scratch for classrooms and auditorium, and so that building has undergone some changes since May. The grounds have been tidied up, the fence removed, the auditorium demolished for vehicle parking, and Larry McCauley's group of campus engineers and custodians have moved from old North Building to East. The building will also be used for warehousing and storage.

The gymnasium will continue to be used for games and physical education.

Towards Gibsonville, the old Matlock store, occupied for a short time by The Pipeline, now faded from memory except for a garish sign on the building, is being taken over by a couple who will teach piano and ballet.

Beside the Winn-Dixie supermarket, the Super Dollar has closed its doors and moved its goods to the Glen Raven store, leaving a vacancy. A drugstore is slotted for the spot.

The one-time Baptist church on West Trolinger which for some years has
