Stern discusses Germany

During the course of his lecture on "Einstein's Germany" Sept. 24, Dr. Fritz Stern said, "Einstein is similar to a latter day Saint Francis of Assisi." He based his comparison on Einstein's appearance and taste, which were simple and modest.

Dr. Stern, Seth Low Professor of History at Columbia University, is considered an authority on Germany, its politics, culture and history. He did his undergraduate work at Columbia University, during which time he met Einstein, who he later found to be his distant relative.

As the lecture went on, everyone's interest seemed to grow. Everyone who attended the lecture left with more insight on Einstein, Germany's culture, and its changes during the Einstein era. His lecture was "brilliant," and "intriguing," students and faculty agreed.

Dr. Bruce Waller of the Philosophy Department introduced Dr. Stern who then began the hour-and-a-half lecture. He described Einstein's character, beliefs, accomplishments, and his treatment by the Germans. When Einstein denounced the Hilter regime, all his books were burned, his works seized and he was exiled from Germany, Dr. Stern said.

Dr. Stern has taught at Cornell, Yale, two universities in Germany, Paris, and now at Columbia University. He has written four books on Germany's culture, history, and some famous people within Germany. He is currently working under a grant from the Ford Foundation on a book on Conporary Europe.
