

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SGA plans size reduction

Present goals for Student Government Association include cutting down student apathy in the SGA Senate. One means of doing this is to cut down the size of the Senate, even though this might cut out representatives who are not either senators or class presidents.

Janice Nelson, senior class president, thinks that one credit hour should be offered to all members of SGA. Classes in parliamentary procedures should be required for these members, which would teach them more about what they are doing and how to write a bill. This would spread the responsibilities of SGA among all the members rather than a few.

Janice Cox, freshman class president, said her duties included attending all Senate meetings, participating on one senate committee and calling freshman class meetings. Ms. Cox and Ms. Nelson both feel the student body is unaware of what their class representatives do. They think there is

too little publicity about what class officers and SGA are doing. They also think the student body is somewhat apathetic in their demands of class representatives and SGA.

All class representatives have a vote in the Senate and all of them serve on a Senate committee. Senior class President Janice Nelson seems to have more responsibility than others. She is an ex-officiate of the Alumni Association, chairman of the Board of Elections, speaker, protem, and parliamentarian. She is also responsible for finding a speaker for graduation.
