During World War II, Dorie Miller was America's first hero on December 7, 1941, when he shot down six Zeros with a machine gun which he had never fired before. He was awarded the Navy Cross. John Hope was the founder and president of the Atlanta University system, and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa twelve years after receiving his M.A. degree from Brown University.

The Construction Dance Company will also participate in the activities with an hour performance on Wednesday at 8 p.m. in Whitley Auditorium.


