# Surveys to be used by new president

The votes are in, the ballots are counted and Elon College has a new Student Government Association president. Bob Moser, 1983-84 SGA vice president, won the election in a runoff vote, taking 229 votes to 170 for his opponent Chris Farris. Moser is a junior political science major from Winston-Salem.

Because the constitution of the SGA states that if there are more than two students running for any executive office there was a primary election held April 13. In this election, Bob Moser had 176 votes, Chris Farris had 156 votes and Tim Malone had 107 with Chris White trailing behind with 1 vote.

Moser learned that he won president April 18 after the final elections were over. He said that he thinks that the voter turnout was much better than last year and that a lot more campaigning was done around campus.

"I plan to continue to work on getting the fall break for 1985," said Moser. Because of a poll sent to faculty and students earlier this year, research and plans have been finished and presented to the Board of Trustees. Yet Dean Chris White has the final approval of whether the break is feasible academically and monetarily.

Moser will be working with Mike Nutt, who defeated Matt Payne for vice-president, and John Smith, who was unopposed for re-election as treasurer.

"Surveys are the main thing," said Moser. He said this will be the way he will find out what students and professors want. With their help and input, he said, he will be able to approach the Board of Trustees with student support for new policies and ideas.

He said regarding the surveys that "a lot of other ways to get student input haven't worked too well" but that with the surveys done this year "we really got good response from students and faculty."
