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Elon reaches goal

"Love makes the difference." This is the theme this year for the Alamance County United Way Fund Drive. Elon College is in Division Five, also known as the Public Service System. The drive started at the beginning of September and will end on Oct. 15.

Elon's United Way campaign has two leaders, Dr. Nancy Harris and Dr. Linda Weavil. In an interview last week, Harris reported, "At Elon we have already reached our goal, which is \$9,020. This goal was a 10 percent increase from last year." Last year Elon collected 129 percent of its goal.

Elon has a wide range of contributors that includes the faculty, staff, retired staff, custodial workers and student organizations. Harris explained, "You can earmark your donation to a specific agency." The agencies in Alamance County range from the Suicide and Crisis Service to the Boy Scouts of America. Other agencies are the Red Cross, United Health Services for Alcohol and Drug Abuse, Children's Home Society, Rape Crisis and the YMCA. The money contributed goes only to services in Alamance County.

CROP Walk is successful

Despite temperatures in the 90s, more than 4,000 people took to the pavement last Sunday in Alamance County's eighth annual CROP Walk.

Organizers of the walk against hunger said they had received at least \$98,000 in pledges from sponsors, who supported the walkers with dollar amounts for each mile they walked.

Representatives of various community organizations and churches walked together, wearing CROP T-shirts and carrying signs and banners to identify themselves.

One sign read, "While we're walking today, 2,100 people will die." Another sign summarized the purpose of the event: "We walk because they walk."

Walk recruiter Steve Hickie said, "We were concerned about the heat, but I'm not aware of any weather-related problems (to walkers). I think more water was consumed at the rest stops; people simply took another cup before beginning the next two miles."

The 10-mile walk began at 2 p.m. at Burlington Memorial Stadium. The rest stops at two-mile intervals offered water and orange drinks to make the event less tiresome. One of the rest stops was at the six-mile mark at Elon College.

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Graduation applications are due

All seniors who plan on completing their course requirements for graduation at the end of the fall semester, winter term or spring semester must file an application for degree in the Registrar's Office by Oct. 31. Applications for degree may be obtained in the Registrar's Office.

Mark Albertson, registrar, is encouraging seniors who have not set up an appointment with him do so immediately so that their academic records can be reviewed before preregistration.

The procedure for filing an application is as follows:

1) The student obtains the application form along with the cap and gown request order form from the Registrar's Office.

2) The student completes these forms and submits a payment of \$22.50 to the Cashier's Office. The cap and gown request order form is retained by the Cashier's Office.

3) Students should then arrange to meet with the registrar to review their academic records. The application for graduation is returned at that time.
