

# End of semester sees faculty, staff departing

At least eight Elon faculty and staff members will not be around when the Fall Semester arrives.

Seven professors and staff members are departing to teach elsewhere or to pursue other interests. An eighth, Dr. Bob Delp, professor of history here since 1986, is retiring from the faculty.

The others are Dr. Paul Bravender, Gayle Fishel, Kathleen McNamee, Dr. Bob Nowell, Todd Olson, Dr. Bob Williams and Dr. Bill Wood.

Bravender has been the chairman of the Fine Arts Department since he joined the Elon staff in 1985.

Fishel, a graduate of Elon and

assistant director of Publications, has worked here for six and one-half years. Fishel said her plans are not definite, but that she's leaning toward a job in commercial art somewhere in this area.

McNamee, an instructor in accounting and business administration since 1983, will be moving to Albuquerque, N. M., with her husband, who will teach accounting at the University of New Mexico next year. McNamee herself will enroll as a student in architecture at the university.

Nowell, an assistant professor of journalism and mass communication, has taught and served as adviser to *The Pendulum* since 1981. He will become an associate professor in the College

of Communications at California State University at Chico.

Olson, instructor of fine arts here for the last year and a half, will spend the summer acting in Galveston, Texas, and then return to Greensboro in the fall.

Williams, an assistant professor of economics at Elon since 1983, will join the faculty of Guilford College.

Wood, assistant professor of business administration and

associate director of the master's of business administration program, is joining the faculty at the University of Northern Iowa. He will be an assistant professor of management and will aid in the economic development of small towns as he helps them plan how to attract new businesses.

"I'll miss a lot of very wonderful people here," said Wood. Olson also said that he regretted leaving Elon. "There was so much

potential with the Fine Arts building and the student involvement."

Fishel said this area was rather lacking in artistic events and that she is looking forward to moving to a community where there are other artists.
