Fine Arts Center Rivals Area in Size

After nearly 22 months of construction, the Fine Arts Center has been completed.

The building contains a 572-seat theater and a 125-seat recital hall, along with art, music, and preforming art studios. According to the August 30, 1987 Burlington Daily Times-News, the center is larger than Duke, Mooney, Whitley, and Alamance buildings put together.

While the Fine Arts Building may not be the biggest in the Piedmont, it rivals many of the cultural art centers in the area with its state-of-the-art equipment.

The theater boasts a stage that is 61 feet wide and 47½ feet deep. This almost doubles Whitley Auditorium's stage. There are 98 lighting instrutments which are controlled by a 36-channel console. The console cn be preprogrammed to call up to 24 different scenes in just seconds.


The 77,000 square foot building also contains a gallery, office areas, and the Isbella Cannon Room. This room was named for a 1924 alumna of Elon who later became the first female mayor of Raleigh, N.C. It will be used for a board room, but it can also double as an art exhibition hall or reception room for over 100 dinner guests.

Some faculty members have moved their offices and classes to the new building but not without some mishaps. Professor Edwin Daniel, art teacher, said that there were some problems but none that couldn't be remedied. "There are no sinks or cabinets in the art studio, but these should be added within the next few weeks," said Daniel.

History Professor and coordinator of cultural programs, George Troxler, said that the move has been fun. "I am a little worried about the theater being set up in time for the premerie September 10th concert featuring classical guitarist, Marcello Kayath," said Troxler.

Professor Troxler said that the "Fly System", which suspends the 98 different lights above the stage is not here yet. "This prevents the electrician from putting the lights up," said Troxler.

Even if the "Fly System" is not here by September 10th, the Marcello Kayath concert will go on as planned. Everything should be set, though, by September 16th for the Shakespeare Festival.
