at \$30, was recovered at the scene of the arrests.

Three arrests were made December 14 in connection with a break-in at the Koury field house in which a VCR and camera were stolen.

Pullen was charged with breaking and entering and larceny in this case also. Scott C. Smith, of Elon College, was also charged with breaking and entering and larceny for the break-ins.

Keith A. Giacomo, 19, of Burlington, was charged with receiving stolen property in the case.

Ingle said that "these arrests are the result of the initial investigation."

According to Beverly Moser, a Victim Witness Assistant for the Alamance County District Attorneys office, only one of the students that was arrested has been to court for the charges.

Pullen has been placed under deferred prosecution, Moser explained that Pullen must perform community service over the next year.

If Pullen completes the required amount of community service, the case will be dismissed and his arrest will not be listed on his record as a conviction, Moser said. She added that she was not certain how many hours of community service Pullen is supposed to complete because the terms are not listed in the D.A.'s records.

Pullen's next hearing is scheduled for January 25, 1989. Snyder's hearing is scheduled on January 21 of this year.

Smith and Giacomo also have hearings this month. Both are scheduled for hearings on February 2.

However, Board says of the school, it is "our obligation to provide the faculty and students with the full measure of services." Board added that the hours during winter-term are comparable to a semester, if one day is lost, it's like losing a week in a semester course.

According to Board, when winter-term is extended, it interferes with the schedule for the turning in, processing, and distribution of grade reports. Also, Board notes, last yer there were conflicts with some student's plane reservation when winter-term was extended. "It's a no-win situation," Board acknowledged.

percent on his investment. Elon was very pleased to receive an A rating from Moody's Investment Service for the 1988 bond series. Moody's rates investments such as bonds with a CCC for high risk investments to AAA for low risk investments. The higher the risk the more interest that has to be paid.

Dan Baker, senior bond analyst for Alex Brown Investments, said, "It is very unusual for a college of Elon's size to receive an A rating." Baker commented that it is a reflection of the college's good management style.

Duke University received an AA rating while Davidson College also received an A rating.

Anyone wishing to help out with a donation of money, food, or clothing, can bring items by Whitley 102.

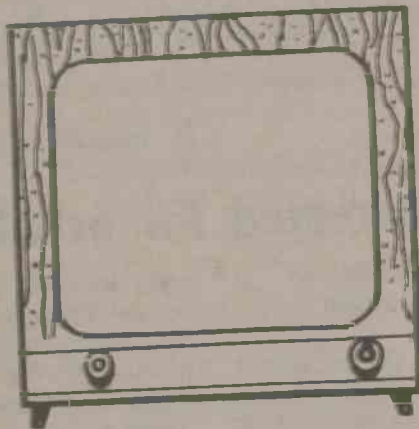
