* Begin building new residence halls for incoming students. The Oaks, for example, have long passed their intended life span. When these new halls are constructed, provide for larger rooms. The residence hall rooms are a student's home for almost nine months. Make it someplace a student won't mind spending

* Rethink the visitation policy. By the time he or she reaches college, a person is old enough to establish his or her own policies about contact with members of the opposite sex. Maintain some residence halls for people interested in visitation hours, but extend or eliminate hours in other halls.

* Install more laundry machines. There's no reason why people should have to do their laundry at midnight just to avoid competition for machines.




