

## Fiddler on the Roof

### Strong dance and vocals is show's focus

Elon's Department of Theatre Arts will open its 1991-92 season with lively dance and vocal numbers in its production of the musical, *Fiddler on the Roof*.


A cast of over 50 students, faculty, and community members will perform Thursday, Oct. 31- Saturday, Nov. 2 at 8:00 p.m. and on Sunday, Nov. 3 at 2 p.m. in the Fine Arts Theatre.

*Fiddler* is directed by Assistant Professor of Fine Arts, Fred Rubeck. "This is by far the largest scale production we've undertaken to date," said Rubeck.

Catherine McNeela, assistant professor of voice, serves as musical director, Rosemary Howard, instructor of dance, as choreographer, and John Drtina, assistant professor of fine arts, as scene and lighting designer.

Elon's production of *Fiddler* also features guest Equity actor, P.T. Kerr, in the lead role of Tevye. Kerr has worked consistently throughout the United States on national tours and off Broadway.

*Fiddler* is set during the eve of the Russian revolutionary period in the Russian village of Anatevka. The story revolves around a Jewish dairyman "trying to maintain tradition while everything around him is changing," said Rubeck. "I

think that's something that applies to anybody, any culture, any time period."

Strong dance and vocals is a focus of this year's production. Senior Lindee LeNoir, who plays the role of Tevye's oldest daughter Tzeitel, said that *Fiddler* features "the best chorus we've ever had. There is incredible vocal talent in this cast."

Rubeck said of the choreography, "We're trying things with dance that go far

beyond anything we've tried before."

Describing *Fiddler on the Roof* as romantic and entertaining, LeNoir recommended the show to students. "The department always puts out top performances," she said.
