Committees comprised of Elon faculty and students are working on the curriculum of the future. General Studies requirements are being reviewed for potential changes.

Committee members felt it was time to update general studies

requirements since it has been 10 years since the last revisions were made.

"With the new general studies program, we are giving students the skills and knowledge that will help them become fully valuable and knowledgeable people," said Dr. Russell Gill, an English professor.

So far, the committees have

made no final decisions. They are still in the research phase of brainstorming and sharing ideas. The committees met in January to consolidate these ideas into two main goals.

The first goal is to be prepared to create proposals over the summer for consideration by the

Elon College received a positive report from the reaffirmation committee representing the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Committee members visited campus earlier this week as part of the association's reaccreditation process.

"I think we have a lot to be proud of. Over the past 10 years, we have done a lot of good things," said Gerald Francis, dean of academic affairs. "We have
