
Thornburg speaks about education

The future of independent colleges and universities' educational programs is an issue that former attorney general and gubernatorial candidate, Lacy Thornburg wants to tackle.

College Democrats of Elon College sponsored Thornburg's appearance at college coffee April 16.

"I came here to talk about subjects that are important to students of an independent college," Thornburg said. "North Carolina is blessed to have 37 independent colleges and universities that provide educational opportunities."
