Faculty ask for non-voting seat on Elon's Board of Trustees

Elon faculty want a voice on the college's Board of Trustees. And if faculty get a seat on the board, students want representation, too.

Administrators and trustees interviewed this week said they want more information and time to discuss the idea of having a faculty member on the board.

"Most of the faculty are very liberal, and we think of the board being rather conservative," said Trustee Ernest Koury. "I don't know if it's good to express both ideas."

President Fred Young said he plans to bring the recommendation to the board.

"I will see that it gets to them, but I don't know how it will be received," Young said.

Of 13 private, four-year North Carolina colleges and universities with enrollments between 1,000 and 5,000, 11 have faculty and/or student representation on their trustee boards.

At the faculty meeting last Friday, Elon's faculty approved asking the trustees for a non-voting seat on the board.

The proposal came from the Faculty Governance Committee, a subcommittee of the Academic Council.

English professor Anne Cassebaum, a member of the committee, said having a faculty member on the board would help communication between faculty and

trustees.

She would like to see faculty have a stronger role in academic decisions.

"I have seen it work before, and I was just used to it. In my past experience, faculty on the board has worked very well," Cassebaum said.

Under the proposal, the faculty representative would be elected by the faculty.

"This recommendation is in the spirit of Elon Vision which seeks to strengthen the academic program of the college. With faculty representation on the full Board, additional information about the academic program of the college would be available to Board members in their deliberations," the proposal

Application deadline for SGA approaching

Elections for all Student Government Association positions are scheduled to be held on April 25 and 26 in the Moseley Center.

Deadline for applications for SGA executive positions and class officers and senators is Tuesday.

Applications for Academic Council senators are due next Thursday.

If a position does not receive any applicants, the deadline will be extended to April 21, said SGA President Larry Williams.

Students will vote on representatives for the At Large Council and Academic Council.

The At Large Council will have 27 senators representing the academic classes.

The Academic Council will have eight senators representing academic majors: fine arts/humanities/communications, two; education/HPEL, two; math/science, one; social sciences, two.

Senators for the Organization Council will be chosen by campus organizations.

Organizations should have their representatives chosen by May 2, said SGA Sen. Kelley Parker.

Organization Council senators would be sworn in with the other senators and officers on May 4.

SGA budget hearings continue through Friday

SGA budget hearings began Monday and will continue through Friday. The SGA Budget Committee is scheduled to discuss the budget proposals Tuesday.

The Student Government Association Senate will then vote on the budget next Thursday.

Last spring, SGA officials had about \$300,000 to allot for this school year.

SGA officials were waiting this past Tuesday to hear how much they had to allot for the 1995-96 budget.

A committee of seven members presides over each hearing.

Members of the committee were chosen by Budget Committee

Chairman Zuni Johnson. The committee is made up of the four executive officers, an adviser, and Student Government Senators. Committee members should be non-biased, Johnson said.

Class treasurers were the first senators considered, said Johnson. Due to schedule conflicts he went to the entire SGA Senate and chose
