### **Residence hal** policy restructuring

In order to improve the quality of life in the residence halls, a committee of faculty, staff and students has been meeting since the beginning of fall semester, proposing changes for next semester.

Dean of Students, Smith Jackson, told The Pendulum, the committee is meeting this week to decide which recommendations gathered in a survey need developing.

Jackson said he was pleased with over 600 students who responded to the survey.

The survey contained eight suggestions for improvements of residence life.

The number one idea, is to restructure the room selection process so students can keep the same rooms from year to year. This will effect many dorms, such as Carolina and Smith. They are currently freshman dorms, but with the proposed plans, sophomores, juniors and seniors will also have right to

live there.

This means students will have the opportunity to "squat" their old rooms for fall semester. The program is also geared so students can select their room and suite mates. Dean Jackson explained restructuring the room reservations policy was undertaken so students can re-See Residence Halls, page 4
