Former U.S. Surgeon General to Speak

Former U.S. Surgeon General Joycelyn Elders will be speaking Monday at 7:30 p.m. in Whitley Auditorium.

Elders, who was appointed surgeon general by President Bill Clinton in 1994, was asked to resign after encouraging the teaching of masturbation as a part of human sexuality.

Elders was born Minnie Lee Jones in Schaal, Ark., in 1933. She was raised in a three-room cabin with seven brothers and sisters.

Elders graduated from high school at the age of 15 and won a scholarship to Philander Smith College. She served as a lieutenant in see **ELDERS**, page 5

Elon's SATs on the Rise

The academic requirements for admittance to Elon College are inexorably rising. As each new freshman class enters, it carries with it a higher average Scholastic Aptitude Test score and a higher average high school grade point average than previous freshman classes.

The steady increase in the entry requirements has been mirrored by a similar increase in the average GPA of Elon students.

The reason for the increase in academic requirements is increased

demand. By March 1996 there were 4,594 applications for admittance to a freshman class of 944.

As of March 28, 1997, the admissions office has received 5,171 total applications for a projected freshman class of between 925-950 students.

"This year the applications have been greater than ever before. The freshman class is filling very rapidly," said Assistant Dean of Admissions Susan Klopman.

The average SAT score for freshman admitted in the fall of 1996 was 1059 with a GPA of 3.2. Klopman expects the scores to continue to rise this year.

"The bottom line is more people. We choose the high GPA/ SAT within our range. We expect the GPA/SAT for fall '97 to be higher," she said.

It is the policy of Elon admissions to place more weight on an applicant's GPA than his or her SAT or ACT scores.

Standardized tests are sometimes criticized for rewarding good test-taking skills rather than talent.

Kathy Lyday-Lee, director of the honors program, said, "I hate standardized tests. A student's GPA is a better method of evaluation. To see SCORES, page 5
