

McKinnon Field is named for Elon alum Bob McKinnon '62 and his wife Ray. The field is identical to many NFL fields.


The arches at the entrance to

honor of Elon alum Nick Theos, who has dedicated his life to education. Furman Moseley made the decision to name the arch after his lifetime friend.




