

Literary magazine unveils special retrospective anthology issue

Tuesday afternoon, Colonnades, the literary and art journal of Elon, unveiled Volume 52, the 2001 special anthology edition.

The retrospective anthology includes selected works from previous Colonnades including a reprint of Colonnade's first cover, published in 1937.

Johannah Lawrence, first-place fiction winner, read a selection from her piece "One Ripening Season." Elizabeth

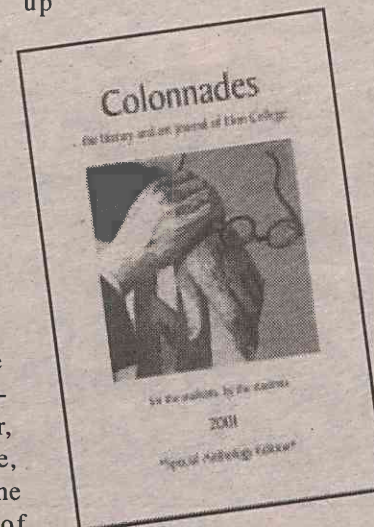
Scott received second place for her piece, "An Impressive Pile of Shells."

-I realized it is hard to look cute after Perspireus, the sweat God, apparently hosed you down after a workout. I featured sites with exercise apparel so hot it



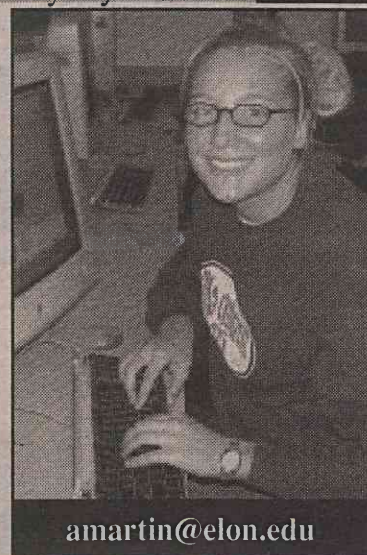
makes you look athletic even when you are struggling and panting heavily after two minutes on the treadmill.
