Elon's recycling program has taken many forms.

"At one time there was separation of the recycling," White said.

There was once a facility on campus where the items were separated. However, it was messy and not very fruitful, according to White. "Administrators then decided to commingle," he said.

Commingling, a process that has been carried into the new program was first used under the former system. Commingling takes place when all items placed into the designated recycling bins are put into one open bed container, according to White. These items include newspaper, plastics, glass and occasionally aluminum. These commingled items are taken to FCR recycling center in Greensboro where they are separated.

White paper in residence halls and apartment complexes is not being recycled. "There is probably a lot of white paper generated here, but not as much as administrative or classroom areas would generate," White said.

Beginning this summer as a

part of the second phase of the recycling program, white paper will be collected from residence halls that have computer labs, according to White.

Collection days vary depending on what is being collected, but recycled materials other than white paper are picked up from residence halls daily. Recycling

in administrative buildings is retrieved every Tuesday. However, commingled items may only be picked up once a month.

White also encourages students to continue being involved in the university's efforts to beef up the recycling program. "I look forward to more student input," he said.

Charlotte's three largest companies are willing to lend the city \$100 million to get started.

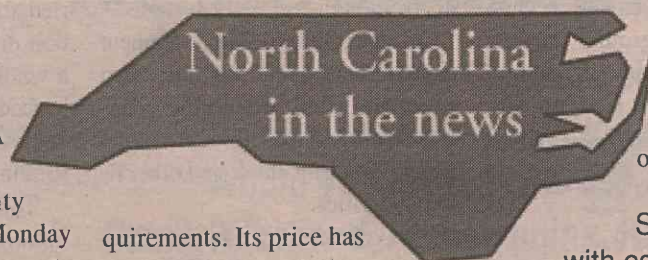
Officials said the rest of the money would come mostly from higher hotel and property taxes.

NYSE Suspends Guilford Mills Trading

Trading of Guilford Mills shares has been suspended on the New York Stock Exchange as the troubled textile maker's stock continues to tumble.

The suspension became effective Tuesday. It comes as Guilford Mills failed to meet minimum price and market capitalization re-



quirements. Its price has fallen below a dollar a share and its worth on the market is below \$15 million dollars for more than 30 consecutive days.

Policy Change Sought To Protect Gays In School

A cross section of gay and straight people, students, parents, and others wants the Forsyth County, Winston-Salem School Board to change a policy.

People with concerns met Monday night to ask board members to add "sexual orientation" to the district's nondiscrimination policy.
