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# New student government officers for next year announced

Wiggins, Townsend, O'Shea and Stejskal to lead SGA's senate

Weeks of campaigning came to a close on Tuesday when next year's Student Government Association officers were announced. Junior Christian Wiggins was elected to the office of president, Katie Townsend to vice president, Kate Stejskal to secretary and Brian O'Shea to treasurer.

Wiggins won with 55.2 percent of the 1,148 votes. His opponents, Katie Gosselin and James Moyer, received 35 and 9.8 percent of the vote, respectively.

Wiggins says his first goal as SGA president after the initial transition is to unite the senate. "If we come together, we can create the students' mission," he said. "It's up to the students to put us together as a team. But now it's up to us to work together as a team."

After months of planning,

Wiggins says he's ready to begin the term.

"In one way, a weight has been lifted off, but there is an enormous amount of pressure that goes back on because you are representing the student body," he said.

Wiggins says he's glad the pressure of campaigning is over.

"Anytime you are too confident, you lose," Wiggins said. "I think maybe I was questioning myself more than students were. I was asking myself, 'Did I meet enough people? Did I hang up enough posters?' You have to put the trust in

Wiggins from Whittier, N.C., has served as executive treasurer for the past two years. He also is a member of Pi Kappa Phi, a head resident and a business fellow.

Moyer was not an elected SGA officer, but has worked with the
