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ARTHUR E. SUTHERLAND

Arthur E. Sutherland is currently the Bussey Professor of Law at Harvard University. He has studied at Wesleyan University, Conn., received the LL.B degree from Harvard, and served as secretary to Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes from 1926 to 1941. He was a Fulbright Lecturer at Oxford and the Purington Visiting Professor at Mount Holyoke College. He has written prolifically in his field of constitutional law. Mr. Sutherland will inaugurate the Symposium at 3:00 in McEwen Hall on Monday.



BRYCE LYON

Professor Bryce Lyon, an eminent American medievalist, is presently chairman of the Department of History and Keeney Professor of History at Brown University. Professor Lyon, having received the Ph.D. degree from Cornell University, is a member of the board of editors of the American Historical Review and has served in the same capacity with Speculum. He is the author of over fifty articles and author, co-editor, or translator of eleven books in his field.



JACK H. HEXTER

Professor Hexter, widely acclaimed for his studies in Tudor-Stuart England, is the C. J. Stille Professor of History at Yale University. He received the M.A. and Ph.D degrees from Harvard. Recipient of Ford Foundation Fellowship, two Guggenheim and Fulbright Fellowships and a Huntington Library Research Fellowship, he is the author of several works as well as the highly provocative collection of scholarly articles and essays, "Reappraisals in History."



THE LIBERAL ARTS FORUM 1968-69

The Elon College Liberal Arts Forum is comprised entirely of undergraduate students. It has been a committee of the Student Government Association since 1958 when it was instituted as a result of the efforts of the Forum's faculty advisor, James Perry Elder Jr. of the Elon History faculty.

The Forum, without question has been the most significant contributor to the intellectual life at Elon, and has gathered probably more than any organization at any small college in the country, the most impressive selection of renowned scholars into one place within the span of a week. This year the Forum will present its fourth week of "Studies in the Humanities". It is currently sponsoring two Humanities Lecture series which will be published upon their completion.

Spring Symposium 1969

Professor O. B. Hardison, the Forum's second Humanities Lecturer, will present his third lecture. He is professor of English at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Author of numerous publications of a variety of topics ranging from the Renaissance and Medieval criticism to a volume of poetry, Hardison received the Charles Homer Haskins Award in 1967. In July he will succeed Dr. Louis B. Wright as Director of the Folger Shakespeare Library.

Professor Heffner, the Distinguished Service Professor of Dramatic Literature at the University of Indiana, is a former Fulbright Lecturer and fellow of Huntington and Folger libraries. His work is in dramatic theory and criticism. Having taught at universities in this country and abroad, a recipient of the American Education Theatre Association's Distinguished Service Award, Heffner is now Distinguished Visiting Lecturer at New York University.



HUBERT C. HEFFNER

Professor French, a native of England, received his Ph.D degree from Cambridge University in physics. Associated with Cavendish Laboratories and the Atomic Energy Research Establishment in England and the Manhattan project in New Mexico, French's research has been in the area of experimental mechanics and properties of matter and the pedagogy of physics. He is presently Professor of Physics, Massachusetts Institute of Technology.



ANTHONY P. FRENCH

Professor Engstrom, distinguished teacher and scholar, is presently the Alumni Distinguished Professor of French at Chapel Hill. His research has been in French literature of the nineteenth century especially in symbolism and literary criticism. When the idea of the Humanities Lectures was conceived of in 1966, Professor Engstrom was offered and accepted the first lectureship. On Friday of this Symposium week, he will deliver the last in the series of six lectures.
