

Seniors Active In Off the Campus Student Teaching

The off-campus practice teaching program at the Fayetteville State Teachers College is in full swing with a total of 15 senior students participating. Eight of them teach under supervision at the local Edwards Evans Elementary School, two at the North Street, and five at the Washington Drive Junior High School. One objective of the program is to place prospective teachers in positions on the field where they can see expert teaching in progress and in turn can get both the practice and the feel of doing it themselves. The work extends throughout the day for a period of 12 weeks.

Conferences for student teachers are scheduled two days a week for an hour. In these group meetings, the students discuss their problems, plan units together, discuss report forms, observe supplementary materials, evaluate teaching techniques and discuss current professional books and pamphlets. Time is given for work periods, for demonstrations, and for the learning of needed skills.
